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TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dorpat, Nov. 20th.—Lettvia and Lithuania have definitely declared to join Esthonia in inviting the Russian Bolshevik to send a delegation to Dorpat to begin peace negotiations, it was announced after the final adjournment this evening of the Baltic States Conference with Bolshevik representatives over the exchange of prisoners. The invitation to the Soviet Govt. will specify December 1st. as the date for the proposed conference, the announcement states.

Washington, Nov. 21st.—State Department officials in discussing the Mexican situation today, disclosed that 3 years ago the Army General Staff estimated that an army of 450,000 men and 3 years would be required for complete intervention in Mexico by the United States.

Montreal Nov. 21st.—Mr. J. Crowe of Toronto was in the city yesterday on his way to New Foundland, he has been in the West Indies, New Foundland, and Canada and his work attracted interest throughout the islands. "The importance of the trade of these islands", said Mr. Crowe, "is not fully appreciated in Canada. To approximately grasp its worth, it should be borne in mind that Canadians at present are importing \$108,000,000 worth of tropical products yearly and the major portion of these from the United States, which is piling up the exchange against. We are importing direct from the West Indies only about \$22,000,000 worth annually. Political and commercial union between the British West Indies and Canada, permanently establishing free interchange of products between these countries, would not only give Canada a convenient market for her surplus pro-

duction but also help to more evenly balance our trade with the United States".

Paris, Nov. 21st.—The Supreme Council decided this morning to give Poland a mandate over Eastern Galicia under the League of Nations for a period of 25 years at the end of that time the League is to determine the future of the territory.

London, Nov. 22nd.—British capital has launched into the glass industry, with the intention of capturing a large share of the world's plate glass business. The British Window Glass Company has been formed and an offering of 300,000 preferred shares, recently was largely oversubscribed. The company is controlled by the British Glass Industries Ltd., which has manufactured glass extensively.

London, Nov. 22nd.—The airplane Kangaroo, under command of Captain G. H. Wilkins, and carrying a crew of four, left for Hounslow airdrome this morning on the first leg of a journey to Australia.

London, Nov. 22nd.—A group of financiers, including Mr. Solomon J. Joel, member of the firm of Barnato Bros. and directors in numerous mining enterprises

in South Africa, has bought out the business of the famous cotton manufacturers Horrockes Crewdson & Company Ltd. of Manchester, says the Daily Mail.

New York, Nov. 22nd.—The release of the embargo on wheat and flour announced by the United States Grain Corporation also permits Canadian wheat and wheat flour to enter American markets free of duty under ruling of the custom's service.
