Proclamation.

THE admirable American custom of turning towards the closing of each year to Almighty God in praise and thanksgiving for the many blessings He has bestowed and the mercies He has shown should continue to be observed here. This year we have good cause to be thankful and to be glad. The star of peace that appeared a year ago is rapidly becoming fixed in the firmament of the nations of the earth due to the long strides being taken by the treaty-making power towards the ratification of the treaty which lowered the curtain on the tragedy of the world war. The League of Nations, a guiding star to the harbor of perpetual peace, is looming up on the horizon. The coming of peace leads us to the dawning of a new day for which we should be very grateful. With safety in our humble homes from the ponderous duties of war we are the better able to reap the crops which it has been our good fortune to have spared to us from the cruel hands of draught and of hurricane. After turning away from the former duty in the military protection of our homes from the contemplated ravages of the enemy we may contentedly enter upon a constructive period with the upbuilding of institutions and municipalities.

While giving thanks for the blessings bestowed upon us during the year, let us ever remember to seek Divine forgiveness and mercy for all errors of act or purpose, and Divine guidance in the performance of the duties which remain to be performed, and to pray that in all we do we shall strengthen those ties of friendship and mutual respect which are so essential in the erection of a municipal structure that is to redound to the credit of the builders.

Wherefore, I, J. W. Oman, Governor of the Virgin Islands of the United States, do hereby designate Thursday, the 27th day of November next as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, and invite the people throughout the islands to cease upon that day from their ordinary occupations and in their several homes and places of worship to render thanks to God, the ruler of nations.

Done at St. Thomas this eighteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nineteen.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

[Continued from yesterday's Avis.]

2nd Appointed Member [Noll] remarked: Mr. Chairman. As a member of the Committee appointed to report on this measure, I can say that I have agreed with all the changes which have been embodied in the report.

It is true that men in the Police Force are receiving twenty dollars per month, but under the present Ordinance they will receive more. I feel myself that in order to have an efficient force it is necessary to pay a living wage. I agree with the Committee Report and recommend its adoption.

1st. Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) remarked: Mr. Chairman. At the meeting of the Committee it was mentioned that the amounts stated in paragraph 5 of the bill be changed to francs instead of dollars, but I do not remember whether any decision was reached on this item. I do not know what kind of dollar is meant, whether American or the so called dollars now in circulation here in this island. It would be interesting to know?

2nd Appointed Member (Noll) replied: Mr. Chairman. I know there is a Danish West Indian Dollar in circulation in this Island which is worth five francs, and I presume that the Committee was referring to a Danish West Indian Dollar.

1st. Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The only dollar I know in existence today is the American dollar.

1st Member for Christiansted Country District (Stakemann) then brought in amendment to the Committee Report.
