They serve to present the champion to those who may have the opportunity of taking lessons under him, and it is hoped that they will be appreciated by Mr. Bonaparte's admirers in the island. In previous notes concerning the champion he has been referred to in these columns as a Barbadian, a fact which by request it is desired to correct, Mr. Bonaparte being a native of the island of Grenada B. W. I. and having resided in Europe 14 years.

Would you be so kind as to endeavour to locate a French Boxer by the name of Marcel Maillet whom I last met at Frankfort on the Maine on the 10th December, 1913 in a scheduled 15 rounds contest under the Auspices of the Box-klub Frankfort

Marcel Maillet fouled me below the belt in a most fatal spot and I fell. The

Referee one Mr. Erhardt gave me the decision but on the grounds that I did not appeal, I asked for ten minutes interval for time to recover and I continued the fight. Note that I was fouled as before mentioned in the second round. Continuing, I came up for the third round to the fifth round after which, I retired under the pains I was still suffering.

Marcel promised me a Return-Match to take place at Paris. At that time I was residing at Prague (Bohemia) and was Trainer to the C. A. C. The outbreak of War prevented me from getting over the frontiers and I was interned for many years in Austria.

I have read of you as being the Secretary of the newly-formed International Boxing Union and hence my reason for writing you to inform you that I have won the B. W. I. Title here last December and my greatest desire is to meet Marcel in a Return Match as was promised.

My height is 5ft. 11ins. Weight 12 stones 31 lbs Please let me know if there is a possibility of you arranging a Match for me as I expect to be on the Continent about the end of March to the first part of April I would not mind meeting any other French Boxers of repute if arrangements can be made. Please give this my request your attention and keep me posted by the return mail.
