"Success depends upon the way and spirit in which both sides tackle the subject. British population is a very valuable thing, and we must see to it that it remains all-British. In closer and more human the understanding, the easier becomes the movement of men, and I may add, of capital, which the empire requires. We want to make that understanding wider and deeper, so that it is never swamped with jealousy, either locally or otherwise. I hope the longer I live the longer I may see the ties that unite them and us steadily strengthened and multiplied until the bond of fellowship which unites us is unbreakable".

London, Dec. 8th. It was announced in the House of Commons today that the supplementary estimates for the navy will be over six million pounds sterling and for the air force nearly two million pounds sterling.

London, Dec. 8th.—British trade returns for November show exports to be over £119,000,000 and an increase of £32,000,000, and imports to be 114½ million pounds sterling an advance of 715,000 pounds sterling over the corresponding figures for November 1919. There is a drop of ten million pounds sterling in raw materials value, but to counter-balance this, a rise of 12,000,000 pounds in the value of manufactured goods for the month.

Barbados, Dec. 9th.—U. S. S. Florida arrived 3.20 p. m. from Hampton roads.

London, Dec. 8th.—Cambridge University today by a vote of 904 to 712 refused women full membership in the University on equal terms with men. Most of the other Universities, including Oxford, have already granted full membership to women, and the decision today means that women attending Cambridge University who are present at the same lectures and take the same honours and examinations as the men, are still prevented from taking degrees. Among the arguments employed by the opponents of the women are that the University would become overcrowded and that Oxford already regrets having granted women full membership. Cambridge wants women to have their own University with a charter enabling the granting of degrees.

"PUBLIC LIBRARY."

On Sunday afternoon in the Hall of the American V. I. Federation of Labor, (Federal Labor Union No. 17261, A. F. of L.,) Miss Adeline Zachert, of the American Red Cross Society, delivered a very interesting discourse to a group of about 500 workers, therein assembled, relative to the organization, equipment, and management of the Public Library.

The Lady in a very scholarly and masterly manner outlined the value of books, and their potent influence upon civilization throughout the ages. She next followed to the equipment of the library, and proceeded to explain the four principal

sub-divisions, viz: Reference Books, i. e. Encyclopedias etc., Non-Fiction; Philosophy, history travel, biography, literature, Science, etc., etc., Fiction Novels, etc., and Books for Young People, and the next began to explain various uses and contents of certain books, which she had brought with her, one by one, until the entire pile was exhausted. In this manner fifty minutes were employed, and before coming to a close, she thanked the assembly for their attention, and concluded by expressing the hope that they would avail themselves of this opportunity to benefit themselves by using the Library, as it would be a very regrettable affair and very ungratifying to know that after such untiring and persistent efforts, it was not appreciated by the public.

The Chairman of the Library Commission, Mr. O. S. Kean, was also present, and in a few choice and appropriate remarks, expressed a similar thought reiterating that in the event of the Public manifesting indifference in the use of the Library, such could only be understood to be a sign of disappreciation, and would perhaps be a future preventative to some other community, who may be badly in need, from obtaining any. He concluded by a forcible exhortation to the gathering to walk in boldly and make use of the Books, since there was absolutely no fees attached to them. Thereafter followed a few other speakers, and after the singing of a song, the meeting adjourned at about 5.55 p. m.—*Com. The Bulletin, Dec. 8th.*
