TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 8th.—Canadian Press. Lord Beaverbrook had five hundred guests at dinner tonight to meet the weekly paper editors from Canada, who are now concluding a tour of Europe. The guests, included Mr. Lloyd George, Lord Birkenhead and Mr. Winston Churchill. "You are welcome," as Mr. Lloyd George said, "to the old hearth stone." He declared Mr. Lloyd George, addressing the gathering, "we have not forgotten you our partners in the Empire did without the name of honour and dignity when we accepted the most formidable challenge ever hurled. I have thought in fear and trembling of what would have happened if that million men from overseas had not come. Europe is in a satisfactory state today but it is peeling on, it will work through, it will be a troubled old continent, but it is a continent of content too, and somehow finds its way in its old muddled fashion." Continuing, Mr Lloyd George said, "Canada could maintain six hundred million people, but we must study the limitations and dangers of empire, as well as its possibilities. Its true mission is to consolidate and reconcile all diversities into one great pattern setting aside prejudices and predilection. I speak as one who recently did the most unpleasant thing a position can do, I voted against my party on an imperial question and I want to make an appeal to all sons of the Empire, that unity should be sought along lines which do not breed discord in any province of the Empire, in all the provinces, including Britain, the eldest of all, there are internal issues which excite

controversy. The Empire must not be made a party question. I am now detached and lead no party, but I love the Empire and believe in it."
