to Germany's last proposal. It is emphasized in circles close to M. Poincare that the Premier's reply to the British note also leaves the door wide open for further discussion.

Dresden, Aug. 3rd.—3,000 Communists today took advantage of the miners strike and seized the United Coal Mine near Swiskua, Saxony, and propose to operate the mine. The police were called, but the last reports were that the Communists were in full possession of the property.

Brussels, Aug. 3rd.—The text of the Belgian replies to the British Reparations notes was published tonight.

New York, July 3rd.—Nothing that Great Britain or the United States could do can help Europe to avoid a smash, un-

less France changes or is forced to change her policy, John F. Sinclair of Minneapolis, Minn., Executive Chairman of the World's Monetary Association, declared today upon his arrival after a five months' survey of the European financial and economic situation. France is pursuing a policy which, if not checked at the election next Spring by the French people, will spell absolute ruin and disintegration for all Europe. Mr. Sinclair urged that the Government of the United States immediately call a world conference on war debts and reparations and invite every nation of Europe owing money as a debtor to another nation, including Germany and Russia, to attend.

London, Aug. 3rd.—The extreme gravity of the Ruhr crisis, as revealed by

yesterday's ministerial statements in Parliament, is emphasized in all the comment appearing today in the London papers, but the unanimity does not go beyond this and the attitude of the various papers towards the government declarations differs today. The moderate liberal Westminster Gazette approves the government decision to appeal to public opinion in this country and abroad as the first essential step towards working out a definite British policy for the salvaging of Europe. It says that the decision must be quickly followed up and that the Government might not be satisfied to remain for many hours in ignorance of its own intentions. The moderate conservative Daily Telegraph infers from Mr. Baldwin's speech that he is determined not to allow the crisis to drift longer and that the Cabinet regards the negotiations with France ended and is determined to appeal from the French Government to the fair and dispassionate judgment of the Western nations. The Premier and Lord Curzon are in fact evoking the aid of publicity to solve a problem that baffles the diplomatist, the newspaper adds. Continuing, the Daily Telegraph hopes such a vigorous expression of opinion will be elicited as to change the policy of France. The resources of civilization are not exhausted and with or without France the Government must go forward in an effort to restore the peace of Europe, it says. The Morning Post, as the leading Conservative organ, tries to reconcile its loyalty to the party's leaders with its pro-France advocacy. It regrets that at this moment Great Britain is more divided from France than at any time since the conclusion of the Entente. The newspaper attributes this to Mr. Lloyd George's blunders, because of which the British Government now is in a helpless and almost humiliating position. Yesterday's statement, the newspaper declares, will convince the country there is no alternative to a policy of cooperation with France, or the alternative is so dreadful, that it cannot be contemplated. It finds, however, consolation in Mr. Baldwin's steady, honest goodwill toward France, and sees indications that the next step will be a step toward acquiescence of the French policy. The Daily Mail, which is an unwavering champion of France, says the British Government's statement was a great disappointment. The Times contends that the very fact that a statement was made constitutes a new and very definite step forward and applauds the Government accordingly. The Government explanation, says the Times, must serve to support British initiative and affect profoundly the course of any further negotiations. The newspaper entertains the hope that the statements and strength of the movement of opinion they must provoke, will be an important factor in promoting an ultimate settlement.
