TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

St. Thomas, Nov. 7th.—Cable communication with Trinidad interrupted. Traffic for that Island and for Demerara will be forwarded by all opportunities and must be accepted subject to indefinite delay.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 5th.—The Winter cruises to the West Indies of the Liner Megantic which were recently announced have been cancelled at the request of the Govt. on account of the shortage of tonnage on the North Atlantic.

Paris, Nov. 5th.—Brigadier-General

Fournier, who commanded the French fortress of Maubeuge at the outbreak of the war, appeared today before a special court martial to answer for the surrender of the fortress to the Germans in September 1916 during their great sweep southward toward Paris in the first stage of the war. A large audience comprising many Generals and high officers were in attendance.

Washington, Nov. 4th.—Despite the spirit of hopefulness in official quarters that the end of the coal strike was near, spokesmen here for miners and operators declared tonight that the country was in for a protracted industrial struggle in the bituminous fields. Labour leaders, a bit more specific than operators, estimated that all Union Mines would remain closed at least four weeks. Other estimates cut that time in half, but officials, although without word of direct efforts to bring the two sides together, still held firm to the view that the strike would not run that long. There were no confidential reports to the Department of Justice from its agents in the fields and reports to Washington headquarters of the operators merely announce that overnight conditions were unchanged.

Boston, Nov. 5th.—The Government cotton condition report of October 24th. of 51.1 the lowest ever reported needed no official statement to verify the general opinion of cotton men that this year's crop was the lowest in grade ever reported. It is also probably the smallest crop since 1900 and must be classed as a failure.

Washington, Nov. 7th.—The crisis in the coal strike remained unchanged today. The Cabinet, which met in special session, took this and the general industrial situation under consideration, but none of the members will say what was the outcome of the deliberations. Hope had been held for an early settlement but the situation is so delicate that fear is general that something may occur to upset all plans. The Attorney-General stated that the injunction against arbitration would be withdrawn as soon as the strike order is recalled. "Mr. Samuel Gompers is waiting at my office", said the Attorney-General, "and I presume he will discuss the matter".

Washington, Nov. 7th.—President Wilson today told Senator Hitchcock, Administration Leader in the Senate Peace Treaty fight, that he would be entirely satisfied with any amendment the supporters of the Treaty might feel justified in accepting, provided they did not nullify the League of Nations Covenant and predesigned for the purpose of interpreting the terms of the treaty. The President expressed strong approval of what supporters of the Pact had done to date towards ratifying the Treaty, but made it plain that there should be no compromise.
