TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

San Salvador, Oct. 17th.—The International Central American Bureau has completed the preliminary preparation for a programme for the proposed Union of the Central American Republic. A conference of all nations affected begins on December 1st at San Jose, Costa Rica.

Cork, Oct. 17th.—The first death among the 11 Sinn Fein hunger-strikers in the Cork jail occurred in the Cork jail last night. Fitzgerald died after having fasted sixty-eight days. The condition of Lord Mayor MacSweeney in the London jail is reported unchanged.

Tokio, Oct. 15th.—Newspapers have announced that China accepts Japan's proposals for the joint military occupation of Southern Manchuria. China requests the withdrawal of Japanese troops when order is re-established.

Havana, Oct. 15th.—Flames which were destroying the American steamer Krakow in a dock here were checked by the city firemen, but started again, spreading to all parts of the ship. The loss is more than \$1,000,000. The Krakow arrived on October 2nd with a cargo of shoes and fabrics.

London, Oct. 17th.—There have been no noteworthy developments in the coal miners' strike. All the mines are idle and a feeling of pessimism prevailed. Mediation is talked of, but no steps have been taken as yet. The Labour leaders have conferred unofficially. Parliament re-assembles tomorrow and it is expected that the industrial crisis will overshadow the Irish question. Transport workers and railway men are expected to decide today whether they join in a sympathetic strike.

Zurich, Switzerland, Oct. 15th.—The German Foreign Minister hears that a great revolt has been started in Moscow. It is reported that the Kremlin has been invaded.

Warsaw, Oct. 15th.—The Polish President Emeral Pilsudski, resigned, but later withdrew his resignation, provisionally, at the Govt's request.

London, Oct. 17th.—A Moscow wireless despatch says that the Poles occupied Minsk after signing the Armistice, but withdrew upon the demand of the Bolsheviks.

Montreal, Canada, Oct. 15th.—The refineries here and in the Maritime Provinces are now closed. They will remain closed until the situation improves. After a conference, the refiners announced

that they would refuse to sell sugar until profitable sales were possible.

New Orleans, Oct. 15th.—The Shipping Board has cancelled all sailings to Cuba temporarily and four vessels loading here have been held up.

Paris, Oct. 17th.—The Federation of theatre workers have ordered a strike of the employees of three theatres, the order was carried out at the Cluny Theatre while a performance was being given, and the Bejazet Theatre did not open its doors, but at the Antoine Theatre the employees refused to obey it, the management having granted their demands.

Paris, Oct. 17th.—In order to encourage the importation of American coal the Government have decided to increase from one hundred and fifty francs per ton the rebate on entry duties granted to imports, this decision to remain in force until January next. The gas and railway companies now hold stocks of about the same size as before the war.

Paris, Oct. 18th. The conference on passports now being held here today examined the question of the visaing of outgoing and transit passports and practically unanimously decided to propose the suppression of the visaing of the former. With regard to transit visas, it was decided that, unless exceptional reasons should require, they should be granted automatically without enquiry, on the simple inspection of the visa of the country of destination, and be valid for the term of this visa.

Paris, Oct. 18th.—A medical conference was opened this morning on the methods to be employed in determining bacillary infection at different ages and the enquiries to be undertaken in various countries on the morbidity and mortality by tuberculosis. A large quantity of information was laid before the meeting by several delegates, notably by the Argentine delegate, Dr. Navarro, and Dr. Manor, of the United States.

Paris, Oct. 17th.—According to a despatch from Berne, former King Constantine of Greece is preparing to take advantage of the situation created in Greece by the serious illness of his son, and contemplates re-entering the country to claim the throne. The Swiss authorities are taking precautions to foil the plot which is being hatched in Switzerland against the regime now existing in Greece. The condition of King Alexander became worse yesterday, but this morning the symptoms were less grave.

Athens, Oct. 18th.—The condition of the King continues serious. He passed all yesterday in a state of somnolence.

Trinidad, Oct. 19th.—The U. S. Shipping Board steamer "Zaca" was destroyed by fire in the Port-of-Spain harbour last night. Cause unknown, crew saved.

Marion Ohio, Oct. 18th.—Replying to a letter from President Wilson regarding a statement made in a campaign speech to the effect that a representative of the
