TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Berlin, June 4th.—In the course of a meeting of the majority socialists party Herr Muller declared that the present Govt. had succeeded in maintaining the unity of Germany. He added that dictatorships in central and south Germany would cause a division of the Rhenish provinces, and concluded by saying that the reconstruction of Germany was only possible under a democratic regime.

St. Thomas, June 5th.—The direct Co's. cable between Jamaica and Turks Island

interrupted, cutting off communication via the Bermuda route with all places beyond Jamaica.

London, June 1st.—Sugar in stock on the 29th. ult. was 154,000 tons. Last year 161,000 tons.

Delayed In Transmission.

London, May 28th.—Sugar in stock on the 22nd inst. was 140,000 tons complete.

St. Lucia, June 6th.—Wireless station at St. Lucia notifies unable accept traffic for Trinidad.

Berlin, May 23rd.—Admiral Von Trotha, former Chief of the Admiralty, Rear-Admiral Leventzow, recently Governor of Kiel and Major Von Falkenjansen, at one time Assistant Secretary of State, have with twelve other military and naval officers, been dismissed from service, because of their participation in the Kapp revolt last March.

El Paso, May 23rd.—General Obregon, in a message yesterday from Mexico City to Robert Pesjura, Financial Agent of the de facto Govt. here, said: "I am transmitting the following message, received yesterday. Early this morning at the town of Tlaxcalantongo, the President of the Republic, Venustiano Carranza, was made prisoner and cowardly assassinated at the cry of 'Viva O'Bregon' by Colonel Rodolfo Herrero and his men, thus violating the hospitality offered him by Herrero".

London, May 23rd.—Some mystery and much speculation surrounds the visit of Sir Robert Philip, former Premier of Queensland, who has just arrived on a

mission about which he will give no information, until he has seen the Secretary of State for the Colonies. He says, however, that he brings serious information, affecting not only Queensland, but all Australia, New Zealand and Great Britain.

Seattle, May 23rd.—Mr. Louis Hill, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Great Northern Railway, today said that five dollar wheat may be expected before the 1921 crop is harvested. The lack of farm labour is assigned as the cause.

Warsaw, May 24th.—The Bolsheviki are attacking in waves on the Northern front, in a thrust to endeavour to break the Polish lines and open communication with East Prussia. The fiercest fighting in months is raging along a 90 mile battlefield, villages changing hands daily and the lines swaying to and fro, the fighting consisting mostly of infantry encounters through open and swampy country. The latest statement says that the Bolsheviki have been thrown back at most places in a two days' battle, with the Bolsheviki, suffering heavy losses in killed. Their armoured trains on this front are reported to be officered by Germans, with many trained machine-guns.

Washington, May 24th. The President today asked authority from Congress for the United States to accept a mandate over Armenia. He told Congress that he thought the wish of the American people was that the United States should become the mandatory for Armenia. He was, he said, conscious that he was urging "A very critic I choice", but he did so "In the earnest belief that it will be the wish of the people of the United States that this should be done". The President's message was read in both the House of Representatives and the Senate, but was discussed in neither. Each House referred it to its Committee on Foreign Affairs, and there was no indication when either Committee would take it up.

London, May 24th.—The observance of Empire Day in England is gradually, if slowly, becoming more pronounced. This year the day falling on Whit Monday, a regular public holiday, the celebrations in the schools happened last week, but were mostly children. A demonstration was held in Hyde Park to-day, eight thousand participating, Prince Albert taking the salute and the Earl of Meath, the founder of the Empire Day movement and Lord Milner attending.

Chicago, May 24th.—Charges that millions of pounds of sugar are being hoarded in Chicago and that the sugar shortage could be ended, if proper methods were taken, were made last night by Alderman Adamowski, Chairman of the City Council Committee on the high cost of living, in an appeal to the Council to support an appropriation for the maintenance of a city food bureau.
