THE FORUM

Sunday afternoon in the Working People's Committee Forum, Mr. Axel-Hol t delivered a very interesting discourse entitled "What is Money?" to a large gathering of workers assembled thereon. The speaker pointed out that there are four different ways to consider money. 1, as a common medium of exchange; 2, as a common measure of value; 3, as a standard of deferred payments; 4, as a store of wealth. He explained the gradual evolution of its presence from savage to so-called civilized society. Barter, he continued suited the period that gave it birth, but at present could not be utilized in a judicious manner. Commerce made it necessary for mankind to have a common medium of exchange etc., and therefore money became a necessity. The state made a certain piece of metal with the necessary inscription a legal tender, carrying with it its measure of value. The speaker forcibly pointed out how defective the system of Barter would be in this age e. g. a shoemaker, baker, or a carpenter, could not procure the necessities of life by Barter, since there would have been no measure of value placed upon their commodities, viz: Shoes, bread, and tables. An instance was cited where Dr. Wallace whilst travelling thru the Malayan Peninsula found out that the natives refused to consider the money he had brought along with him for compensation when necessary. He was forced to get beads, looking glasses, etc. etc, to give them in lieu of money, which was
