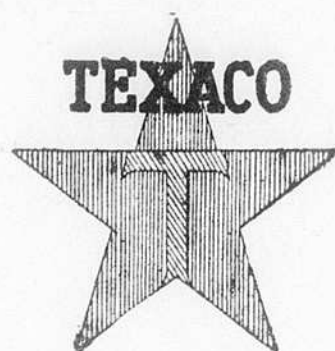

We reprint today a translation of an article we read some time ago in Nordlyset of 20th. ultimo, under the heading "Epidemics and the Virgin Islands", in which Lieut. R. L. In this case we do not know whether the Public Works Officer or Nordlyset is responsible, but that does not alter the fact that what is reported is decidedly wrong in many particulars.

Said MELVIN TINSLEY is hereby summoned to appear before the District Court to be held in St Thomas on Monday the 7th June 1920 at 10 o'clock a. m. or if no Court should be held on this day, then on the first ordinary court day thereafter, to show cause why judgment should not be given for the plaintiff.

The plaintiff will appear before the Court and produce witnesses and other evidence to sustain her request.

As regards the hospital question, doctors being available, and operations for appendicitis, it can be stated with no fear of contradiction that the hospitals were as open to the public as they are now. The poor was no worse off for obtaining medical treatment in so far as expenses were concerned, and the islands can boast of having had some of the most efficient doctors. Operations for appendicitis are too numerous to mention, and the names of Drs. Petersen, Zwergius, and Heyn will always live in the memories of the people for the surgical skill displayed in operations of various kinds, performed perhaps without some of the many modern conveniences now at hand, but none the less successfully and satisfactorily. It is suggested that it be looked into to prevent perverted reports of these islands being unauthoritatively spread abroad, and we have no

doubt that the necessity of this will be obvious to the average person interested in the affairs of his home, such erroneous versions as the one in question, tending as we believe, to misrepresent the people and discourage interest in their welfare. As regards yellow fever, it would be interesting to know whether there has been a case of yellow fever in the Virgin Islands within the last twenty years.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Chile, Nov. 29th.—The "Nacion" today says it has learned from well-informed diplomatic circles that there is a possibility of mediation by the Government in the A. B. C. group (Argentina, Brazil, and Chile) with the object of compromising the difficulties that have arisen between the United States and Mexico over the case of Consul Jenkins.

London, Dec. 2nd.—Sugar in stock on the 29th ultimo was 102,000 tons. Last year 202,000 tons.

London, Nov. 28th.—Captain Bertram Hayes, Commander of the steamer "Olympic", has been invested with a Knighthood at Buckingham Palace. The "Daily Mail" says the honour to Captain Hayes as an officer of the International Mercantile Marine, stamps the latter as a great national service, and seals the new status it has won so worthily.

Berlin, Dec. 1st.—The Government has sent to the Peace Conference at Paris a
