"RUNNING THE BLOCKADE"

On Saturday afternoon, the British cable "City Belle," of West End Tortola. Capt. Wm. Industrious, arrived here with a cargo of bananas, potatoes, etc. etc. On "being entered", it was however discovered that she was "running the blockade," having booze smuggled on board.

Upon search being made, part of the booze, which consisted of three cases of whiskey, and one of gin, was found under the bilge, another portion among a bag of sweet potatoes, and yet a third portion under some bunches of bananas.

The boat was immediately seized, and the cargo of booze confiscated, while steps towards prosecution for the infringement of the law providing against the importation of spirituous liquors into the island were begun.

For transgression of the law, the Captain was fined \$100; the owner of the liquor, Ernest Martin of Tortola, \$292, while the confiscated booze was sold at public auction at the Customs Department yesterday morning realizing about \$60. The fines having been paid, and the law thus far satisfied, the boat was released. But we have been made to understand by those who should know, that in order to eliminate the practice of smuggling, that the authorities having control of the situation intend to apply more drastic measures in the future—the confiscation and sale of the smuggler, perhaps.
