TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 5th.—Russel Codman, the Boston oarsman, was eliminated from the competition for the Diamond Sculls today, being defeated by Gollan, Great Britain, victor over Walter Hoover, United States, yesterday. The Englishman won by two lengths in 8 minutes 30 seconds. Brasenose College, Oxford, won its heat in the Grand Challenge contest today. The Oxonians defeated the French eight by a length in seven minutes and three seconds.

Huddersfield, July 5th.—Six persons were killed, including two railway guards and seven persons were injured in a train wreck today at Diggle near here. The Leeds Manchester Express, drawn by two engines, collided, while running at full speed with an engine outside a tunnel, the crash piling up a mass of

wreckage. Doctors and ambulances from the surrounding districts were summoned to the scene.

Portland, Oregon, July 5th.—President Harding spoke at an Independence Day gathering here yesterday. A feature of the parade was the participation of two companies of sailors and marines from the British cruiser Curlew in the harbour. Special arrangements enabled them to carry their arms. The President prefaced his address by declaring that a bit of history was recorded today in Portland, for never until today had a contingent of British naval forces marched in an independence day parade.

New Orleans La., July 5th.—Mr. Coker chairman of the New Orleans young men's gymnastic club, today announced an offer of "up to half a million dollars" for a return match between Dempsey and Gibbons, for New Orleans.

London, July 4th.—Art O'Brien, president of the Gaelic league in London, and five of his colleagues, who were released from internment in Ireland under a court decision upsetting the regularity of their deportation from England, were found guilty today of seditious conspiracy. O'Brien was sentenced to two years and the others to one year each.

Moscow, July 5th.—A new internal church war has begun. Dr. Tikhon, recently released from prison, singing himself boldly as patriarch, has addressed an appeal to faithful "clergy and laymen" deprecating the new church and declaring that his unfrocking was illegal and without effect. At the same time the reformed church groups had a joint conference, deciding to bury the hatchet temporarily and unite to oppose Dr. Tikhon. Dr. Tikhon's appeal brands the

revivalists as seekers after profits, titles and awards.

London, July 5th.—England is experiencing a recrudescence of individual troubles. A battle took place last night at Whitehaven between miners and police. A strike has been in progress some weeks against a reduction of wages. The strikers have no funds, except seven shillings from the poor law. A breakdown of negotiations on Monday led to an outbreak of window smashing, and the colliery managers car was burned. Police reinforcements were drafted into Whitehaven yesterday, which caused fresh exasperation at nightfall. A crowd in which women were foremost, attacked the company's office. The police dispersed the crowd by baton, but after midnight in dense darkness, the crowd returned to the attack with picks and cobble stones. Missiles were rained on the police, over fifty of whom were injured. The police had to say in refuge, leaving the crowd in control of the town. Many shops in the main streets were wrecked, windows being broken and goods stolen. More police reinforcements have been rushed to Whitehaven and the Mayor has issued a proclamation requesting all citizens to stay indoors. The dockers strike has spread to all ports. Thirty thousand men are out in the London docks. Though the strikers are in the wrong technically, as they have broken an agreement, they are entitled to much sympathy.

Winnipeg, Man., July 4th.—Approximately 250 members of the active militia passed through Winnipeg late last night from camp Hughesman enroute to Sydney, where it is understood they will be used in maintaining law and order in the strike area. According to the troops they are being sent in response to an emergency call. The contingent comprises units of the Strathcona Horse and Princess Patricia's Canadian light infantry.

London, July 5th.—Orders were received here last night from Ottawa to prepare a further draft of medical ordnance army service and other units for immediate transportation to the Sydney N. S. strike area.

Montreal, July 5th.—A detachment of the royal Canadian regiment has been sent from camp to Sydney.

Berne, July 5th.—The first of the series of giant aeroplanes ordered by the Russian Soviet Government from the works at Friedrichshafen, on Lake Constance, was delivered in Moscow yesterday. The planes are of a new type of the Dormoer Comet, built almost exclusively of aluminum, to carry four passengers, besides the pilot and mechanic. They have engines of 200 horsepower, with an average speed of 100 miles an hour. The Russian Government announces its intention of using the planes on its Ukranian service.
