Y., and its property, including among other things all trademarks and registrations thereof, instrument dated August 23, 1923 and recorded in the United States Patent Office, on October 29, 1923; and that the said assignments with respect to the above mentioned trademark No. 33,389, have this date been recorded in the Office of the Government Secretary of the Virgin Islands of the United States, at St. Thomas, in accordance with the provisions in the regulations governing the registration of patents and trademarks in the Virgin Islands, approved June 30, 1920.

TIDAL WAVE IN FRANCE.

Biarrit France, Jan. 9th.—A tidal wave early today tore a dozen fishing vessels from their moorings and wrecked them and swept away the parapet of the promenade on the embankment. During the tempest the sea was washed a hundred yards inland into the ground floors of seashore homes and shops. Similar damage is reported from nearby ports. At Lea Sables D'Olonne on the Bay of Biscay a number of vessels broke their anchorages and were set adrift. Part of the promenade embankment was washed out and many small boats were wrecked on the shore.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Jan. 8th. An abridged edition of the Bible is being prepared by Cambridge University for the use of schools. Entitled the "Children's Bible", the compilation is being made upon the recommendation of the Cambridgeshire Advisory Committee, comprising representatives of the various churches and of the teaching profession, under the Chairmanship of Dr. Pearce, Vice-Chancellor of the University. Passages considered unsuitable for children will be omitted from the new edition, which will be about two thirds the size of the authorized scriptures.

London, Jan. 8th.—One of the largest fires seen in years was still blazing at daylight this morning in the neighbourhood of the West India docks. The flames started at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and up to an early hour this morning had involved no buildings of importance, but the fact that the warehouses within the area of the fire were stored with rubber, oil and similar inflammables, caused a tremendous blaze. Throughout the night the flames illuminated an extended distance and greatly taxed the energies of the firemen who combated them with the aid of seventy engines.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 7th.—Old fashioned open grates and the cold wave have taken approximately a score of lives in the South since Saturday, according to reports received here today. Tonight there were indications that normal weather would return by tomorrow or Wednesday. Eight persons are known to have died from burns and exposure in Georgia while reports say a number suffered from exposure through serious fire mishaps. In New Orleans and its vicinity six persons were reported to have died

and in other sections of the South there were reports of open grate for cold wave victims. The cold weather passed on to the tropics today, causing the thermometer to drop to 62 in Havana and leaving smudge fires burning in the orange groves of Florida. Low hanging clouds, whipped by a fresh breeze that swept the peninsula, saved Florida's citrus crop, growers agree, and the temperature in some parts of the belt was reported as having reached the freezing mark, but without frost.

London, Jan. 8th.—So much delay has occurred in the return by the Dominion Governments, of the drafts of the proposed liquor treaty between Great Britain and the United States that it now appears likely the document may not be signed before the dissolution of the present Government. The draft text, which comprises about 1,200 words, was sent to the Overseas Governments for approval several weeks ago by mail and up to the present no responses have been received by the Foreign Office.

London, Jan. 8th.—The fire which has been raging since yesterday afternoon along the flames, in the neighbourhood of the West India docks, was extinguished at noon today. Buildings extending over an acreage of a quarter of a mile were consumed by the flames. The damage is estimated at more than 200,000 pounds. The firemen laboured throughout last night in relays, trying to stop the spreading fire and keep it from coming into contact with the adjoining warehouses filled with inflammable goods. Large numbers of firemen tonight were watching the smouldering ruins, amid the fumes of frizzling rubber coming from one of the largest buildings destroyed.

London, Jan. 8th.—Sir Herbert Matthews being of the opinion that agriculture is not adequately represented in the House of Commons, has originated the idea of starting a new political party, to be known as the rural party. In an interview Sir Herbert pointed out that every civilized country had a separate party devoted to rural welfare. The time had come for Great Britain to follow their example, he said. The committee, which had inquired into the state of agriculture, had stated that immediate action was essential, and that there should be a law that no able-bodied agricultural worker, working full time, should receive less than thirty shillings a week and that credit facilities must be created in order to enable farmers to pay increased wages. The Rural Party, Sir Herbert continued, had its representatives in both Houses of Parliament. Its program briefly would be, maximum economic production from, and maximum employment upon the land, a living wage and better conditions of life for the rural worker, and the organization of agriculture and allied industry.
