TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

St. Thomas, Sept. 8th.—Traffic of all classes for Demerara is now being forwarded by mail, communication with Demerara being entirely suspended. Messages must be accepted to indefinite delay.

Paris, Sept. 5th.—It is understood that the Commission of the Allied Generals sent to Fiume to investigate the disturbances there in which French soldiers were killed, has made recommendations to the Peace Conference which include the maintenances of public order in Fiume by a British and American police force.

Rome, Sept. 5th.—The conclusions attributed to the Inter-allied Commission inquiring into the Fiume incident are so erroneous, says the Giornale D'Italia that they seem impossible as coming from representatives of Govts. with whom for five years Italy has lived in the brotherhood of arms and to whom she has given luminous proofs of friendship. Their conclusions, if reports are true, are blows which would be hardly comprehensible even if the communication, instead of being from allied nations, had been composed of officials of the old Austrian empire. Late in June there were several clashes between Italian and French troops in the city of Fiume, it being alleged by the Italians that the French soldiers in the city were antagonistic to the Italians and had trampled upon Italian flags which had been wrested from Italians in the streets. The Council of Five of the Peace Conference appointed a commission to investigate the trouble. This Commission completed its work some time ago but the text of its report has not yet been made public.

London, Sept. 5th.—The industrial situation in Great Britain at the present moment appears far less grave than a few months ago when there was a threat of a complete upheaval of labour. Since the settlement of the Yorkshire strikes, there has been no trouble of great magnitude although small strikes in various industrial pursuits are still frequent and tramway workers are threatening a national walkout if a wage advance is not granted. General unrest, however, throughout the country, has been lessened since Ministerial revelations of the nations grave financial position which seem to have had a moderating effect. Influential labour leaders have done their utmost to impress workers with the imperative need of speeding up the industrial output and moreover the Govt. has promised early legislation for a 48-hour week and a minimum wage for all industries.

Paris, Sept. 4th.—"Germany defeated on the west has turned to the east where she is waging a battle with the hope of achieving the victory she could not win on the other front", M. Paderwski, Premier of Poland, declared today to the Associated Press while discussing Polish peace conditions. M. Paderwski will appear before the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference to discuss the critical situation. "In upper Silesia, East Prussia, Lithuania, along the Bolshevik front, in the vicinity of Minsk and along the Ukrainian front, Polish armies are forced to face armed enemies", he continued, "while these armies are not Germans, they are aided by Germans, who are assisting the Bolshevik forward in every way possible to embarrass Poland. Our new Govt. with limited supplies and little clothing for its army finds the situation desperate".
