ST. CROIX STATION.

London, June 29th.—The match between the touring West Indians and Lancashire was continued yesterday at Manchester, the visiting team scoring 215 in their first innings and 150 for the loss of four wickets in their second innings. The scores were as follow. First Innings—Challenor 6, Tarilton 5, Nunes 3, Fernandes 49, Ince 0 Snall 91, Holt 39, Constantine 10, Browne 0, Pascall (not out) 0, Francis 0, extras 2. Total 215. Second innings. Challenor 35 Tarilton 50 Nunes 9 Fernandes not out 32 Ince 16 Snall not out 6. extras 2. Total for 4 wickets 150.

Sydney, June 27th.—At a cost of about \$10,000 a radio-direction finding station is being constructed as an aid to navigation at St. Paul's Island, off the extreme northern tip of Cape Breton, at the junction of Cabot Strait and the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

London, June 28th.—The German U-Boats commanders who escaped the arm of the law after their exploits in the war are now imprisoned by the French in the Ruhr and are likely to receive stern justice, says the Dusseldorf correspondent of the Daily Mail. The first of these is Paul Audier, who commanded the submarine 9A. He is now charged with complicity in the explosion that partly wrecked the Rhinehern canal. The second is Otto Holden, accused of sabotage in the Bochum district, and the third is commander Rose, who navigated the U 53 in its trip to the American coast in 1915. He is now suffering from the effects of a severe beating administered by a Belgian officer whom he insulted.

Wimbledon, June 28th.—Royalty graced the boxes at the Wimbledon stadium today, as play was resumed in the final tournament for the world's lawn tennis titles. Ex King Manuel of Portugal, with his consort, watched the centre court matches from the royal box and the King and Queen arrived at three o'clock after two sets had been played

Wimbledon, June 28th.—Mlle Suzanne Lenglen continued her progress in the womens singles by defeating Mrs. B. C. Covell of England 6-0, 6-3. The Englishwoman, after some unsteadiness in the first set, due probably to being opposed to a champion, played a remarkably good game returning many shots which the French star intended for placements. Suzanne was playing at top speed in the second set, jumping for high ones and making shoestring pickups.

New York, June 28th.—The raw sugar market was unsettled early today, with no interest shown by refiners. Cuba's were offered by operators at 5½ cents, cost and freight, equal to 7.03 for centrifugal, while Java sugars were available at even below the level, without finding buyers.

London, June 28th.—Sir Guy Gaunt, Conservative Member for the Backrose division of Yorkshire, asked the House of Commons today whether the Government, in allocating the mail contracts, would seek to encourage the British steamship lines in the use of the routes via Halifax, which he claimed would do away with the present "grave difficulties" affecting emigrants to the United States and the inconvenience caused by the application of the United States domestic legislation to other nationalities. Sir Haming Northington-Evans, the postmaster general, replied that the mail service contract provided for the direct route. The Halifax route, he added,

caused extra handling and delay of the mails and he was not prepared to make the change.
