IT is hereby brought to public notice that The Locomobile Company of America, of Wheeling, West Virginia, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of West Virginia, whose trademark No. 33,389, which was registered in the United States Patent Office, Washington, D. C., on August 15, 1899, was registered in the Office of the Government Secretary of the Virgin Islands of the United States on March 29, 1920, has assigned all its assets, business, good will thereof, letters patent, trademarks, registrations, applications therefor, copyrights and recorded claims thereto, on April 1, 1920, to The Locomobile Company, a corporation of Delaware, instrument dated July 21, 1921, and recorded in the United States Patent Office on August 9, 1921; and that the said The Locomobile Company, corporation of Delaware, by its trustee in bankruptcy, on October 27, 1922, transferred to Locomobile Company of America, Incorporated, a corporation of New York, 1819 Broadway, New York, N. Y., all its property, including among other things all trademarks and registrations thereof, instrument dated August 23, 1923 and recorded in the United States Patent Office, on October 29, 1923; and that the said assignments with respect to the above mentioned trademark No. 33,389, have this date been recorded in the Office of the Government Secretary of the Virgin Islands of the United States, at St. Thomas, in accordance with the provisions in the regulations governing the registration of patents and trademarks in the Virgin Islands, approved June 30, 1920.

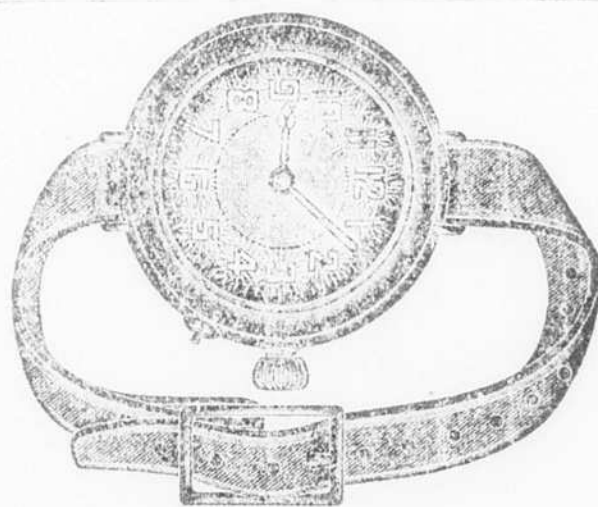

GOVERNMENT OF THE
VIRGIN ISLANDS OF THE UNITED STATES

IT is with much gratification that I inform the people of the Virgin Islands that The Honorable, The Secretary of the Navy, is sending an officer of the Civil Engineer Corps of high rank, to the Virgin Islands for the purpose of investigating and reporting upon the means of providing a water supply for the towns of St. Thomas, Christiansted and Frederiksted. It is expected that this officer will reach the Virgin Islands the latter part of the present month.

The Honorable, The Secretary of the Navy, has also informed me that the Department of the Interior has agreed to send a Reclamation Engineer to the Virgin Islands to investigate and report upon the possibility of water conservation for agricultural purposes, and that this engineer will probably arrive in the Virgin Islands the latter part of February.

We have now the assurance that the problem of water for the Virgin Islands is about to receive the expert investigation necessary to eventual solution and in view of this, I earnestly urge that the people adopt an optimistic view as to what the future may hold for us.
