IN reference to the resolutions said to have been passed by the Supreme Council of the Labor Union in session assembled, it is hereby made known;

1. That there was no session of the Supreme Council on June 14th, but only certain members of the Supreme Council invited to a meeting where Mr. Brow acted as Chairman and Rev. Barrow as Secretary.

2. That the Chairman of the Supreme Council who is the President of the Labor Union was unaware of the proceedings, as also the Executive Officers of the Union and a number of other members of the Council.

3. That no meeting of the Supreme Council can be convened except in the regular way prescribed by the laws of the Union.

4. That, regardless of who disapprove, the president acted within his constitutional authority when, after serving several notices on Rev. Barrow to vacate the premises, finally took legal steps to enforce his request; and the Court upheld the action, in spite of whoever tries to set at naught the Court's decision.

5. Rev. Barrow is not at present acting Director of the Educational Department, nor is he a member of the St. Croix Labor Union.

The Executive Officers of the Labor Union refuse to be led away into any agitation that they realize is bound to ultimately destroy the good relations and peace in the community.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE COLONIAL COUNCIL FOR ST. CROIX.

(Continued from Saturday's Avis.)

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) again took the word and said, I left off at the Department of Public Health. I said then that the Municipal Committee was fully cognizant of the desire and sentiments of the Council regarding the establishment of a new office without being consulted, but after careful consideration we thought that we would give this office a trial for one year.

In the Sanitation Service the salaries were changed to what they were last year, except that the veterinary inspector is struck out for the reason that it was suggested that we get a regular Veterinary Surgeon and that his appointment and salary be fixed by ordinance.

King's Hill Poor Farm—This institution was established without the consent of the Council, there seems to have been some misunderstanding, but in going over the matter with the Government we all agreed that there should be such an institution, but the creation and working of same should be fixed by ordinance. If no amount was budgetted, the institution would cease to function at the end of the fiscal year,

therefore Frcs 47,500 was granted, the same as was done last year.

With regard to the Department of Public Instruction, the Director assures us that he intends to make a thorough reorganization, and therefore we did not make much changes in that Department.

The amount for the Public Library has been put the same as last year.

Public Work Department under equipment. There are items there that were budgetted last year and it was thought that it was not necessary to budget them again this year, but after consultation with the Assistant Public Work Officer, we found that the amounts budgetted for those items last year were used in buying a truck. With regard to new construction, all that were not absolutely necessary were stricken.

Pension to Policeman Griles, that was stricken, as he has departed this life.

Subsidies for the Native Brass Band of Christiansted and Century B. B., Frederiksted, the Naval Band has been removed from this island so we recommend that the amounts be doubled and more service given to the public by the bands. Those are all the recommendations. I think I have answered the member's questions.

4th Appointed Member (Blackwood) remarked: Mr. Chairman. I beg permission to call the attention of the Honorable Chairman of the Municipal Committee to an item that has been stricken from the budget—Two room school at Diamond. That seems to be a mistake; the school is intended for Annally and not Diamond. My attention was called to that today by the Director of Education.

2nd Member for Christiansted Town (Canegata) remarked: Mr. Chairman. The Municipal Committee from all papers submitted to it it understood that the school was intended for Diamond.

1st Member for Frederiksted Country District (Andersen) remarked: Mr. Chairman. On this particular point I wish to make a remark. I think it is quite alright to strike out that two room school at Diamond for the present, for the Catholic Fathers contemplate building a school at Adventure. We should let them go ahead first and then we will see if it is necessary to build a school at Diamond. The population of the island is decreasing and maybe a new school at Adventure will release conditions at Diamond School in the future. I think it is alright to wait a year and keep the matter under observation.

At present I am very much in favor of economy. I consider, in looking upon the changes made by the Municipal Committee, that they have done a great piece of work for which they deserve great credit; but I think they could have been more severe with new construction, and the Police
