TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, March 30th. - Official circles expressed the opinion today that former Emperor Charles in his attempt to regain the Throne of Hungary was misled by monarchists, who advised him that the time was ripe for his return to Hungary. The advice of regent Horthy to Charles to leave the Country immediately is received here as substantiating the view that there is no support for a mercantile coup in Hungary at present. The Hungarian regent realizes it is said, that while there are Hungarian elements who would welcome a restoration of the monarchy, the great majority of the people are convinced that the Hapsburg and particularly Charles cannot assume the royal power. It is believed here that Charles will not make a further attempt to return to Hungary. If he should do this, the Allies would do nothing aside

from applying moral persuasion against his return to Hungary, it is said, and such Allied action would be interference in the domestic affairs of Hungary, but as a protection to Europe in general, against the possibility of being involved again in war, which competent authorities assert would be inevitable, upon the return of the Hapsburg to power.

Paris, March 31st.—The Allied Foreign Office which deferred until after Easter, although negotiations regarding Germany's refusal to pay the installment of one billion gold marks for the reparations account on March 23. At the Behest of the reparation commission, now are exchanging views, on the whole situation with reference to Germany, it was announced here today. The exchange of views, it was announced, probably will terminate in another Allied Conference at the beginning of May. It is unlikely any important measures will be put into effect in the meantime. The plan for collection of customs on the line of the Rhine now has been approved by the different Govts. and their Ambassadors will meet in the near future to adopt it formally.

London, April 1st.—Sir Edward Carson was entertained by the West India Club on March 30th, the occasion being his forthcoming marriage. The gathering was presided over by Mr. Robert Rutherford, Chairman of the West India Committee.

Paris, April 1st.—Warning was given Hungary today by the Allies that the restoration of the Hapsburg, Dynasty would entail disastrous consequences for the Hungarian nation this warning, through the Council of Ambassadors constituted a virtual ultimatum from the chief Allied Powers, including Great Britain, France, Italy and the lesser associates.

Paris, April 1st.—Resolutions protesting against the restoration of former Emperor Charles in Hungary and warning the Hungarian Govt that the consequences of such an event would be disastrous were adopted by the Council of Ambassadors here today. The resolutions were presented by M. Jules Cambon, acting in the name of the French Govt. "The events of which Hungary is the theatre," the resolution read, "place the principal Allied Powers under obligation to recall to the Govt. and the people of Hungary the terms of their declaration of Feb. 4th 1920. In this declaration the Council of Ambassadors declared the principal Allied Powers considered that restoration of the Hapsburg family would not be consistent with the principle for which the war had been fought and at variance with the whole basis of the peace settlement, and that such restoration would neither be recognized nor tolerated by them" "faithful to the principles enunciated in that declaration", continues the resolution, "the
