TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Bagdad, Aug. 23rd.—In the courtyard of the Govt. building at 6 o'clock this morning Prince Emir Feisal formally ascended the throne of the Irak region. A great assemblage witnessed the ceremony. Sir Percy Cox, the British High Commissioner for Mesopotamia, read a proclamation declaring

the British recognition of Prince Feisal as King, and handed him a personal message of congratulation and greeting from King George. This message announced the approaching conclusion of a treaty "to consecrate the Alliance into which we entered during dark days of the war."

Berlin, Aug. 23rd.—Final instructions relating to the treaty of peace between the United States and Germany have been received from Mr. Hughes by Mr. Ellis, U. S. Commissioner here and the treaty now awaits signature by the German Government. It is expected the document will be signed in the next few days at a special meeting of the Cabinet, which will be attended by President Ebert. The document will bear the President's signature and will be counter signed either by Dr. Joseph Wirth, the Chancellor, or Dr. Friedrich Risen, the Foreign Minister.

Washington, Aug. 23rd.—Panama will not resist the occupation of the disputed territory of Coto by Costa Rica, the U. S. Minister at Panama today cabled the State Department he had been informed by the Panama Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Boston, Aug. 23rd.—All British aspirations for United States lawn tennis doubles championship honours were defeated today when three teams from over-seas were eliminated by American combinations in the second round of the title tournament on the courts of the Longwood cricket club. The English Davis Cup combination of Woosna, and Turnbull was turned back by Williams and Bastian, middle western champions 5-7, 6-3, 6-4. The British team of Low and Meyers lost in straight sets to Bandy and Bell, 6-2, 6-4, 6-1. The King brothers defeated Gilbert and Yencke, a third British team, 6-2, 6-2, 6-4.

London, Aug. 24th.—The population of the British Islands adjacent to the United Kingdom is 299,704 according to census returns published yesterday. The population of the Indian Empire 319,075,132, an increase of 1.2 per cent. Of the union of South Africa, Europeans only, 1,521,635 and increase

of 19.2 per cent. Of Australia, excluding full blood Aborigines, 5,426,008, an increase of 21.8 per cent, and of New Zealand, excluding the Maoris, 1,218,270 an increase of 20.8 per cent.

Bombay, Aug. 24th.—A grave situation has arisen in the Malabar district on the West coast of British India, where seditious agitators have been working on the religious fanaticism of the ignorant natives. Their activities have resulted in serious mass rioting, bloodshed and destruction of property. Military forces have fired upon the rioters, causing many casualties. Railway lines have been cut, post offices have been robbed, and mob law is almost supreme in several small towns. One village, surrounded by a mob has been repeatedly making despairing calls for help. Military reinforcements have arrived at Bangalore, capital of the district of Mysore. A proclamation has been issued by the British Officer commanding the troops in the Malabar area. It refers to "open rebellion prevailing in the district of North Ponani", thirty eight miles southeast of Calicut. Several murders have been committed, the victims including a military officer and a superintendent of police.

Melilla Morocco, Aug. 24th.—Reports received here from El Arish state that Raisuli, the rebel leader in this region, (probably Raisuli the famous bandit is meant), has sent an emissary to the Spanish High Commissioner, offering to surrender. The reason for his offer, he said, is the bad state of his health, as he is suffering from excessive obesity.

Dublin, Aug. 24th.—The reply to Great Britain's terms for a settlement of the Irish question will be delivered at Mr. Lloyd George's official residence in Downing Street Thursday night or Friday morning, it is expected. The delivery, it is thought, will precede the proposed public meeting of the Dail Eireann. In the preparation of the reply on which Mr. De Valera and the other leaders were working today, while the Dail Eireann was taking a recess, the "cabinet" has the benefit of advice from the members of the Sinn Fein executive committee, which is composed of somewhat older men than the average of the Dail Eireann membership. These men were participants in the conference today over the terms of the reply now being framed.

Hull, England, Aug. 24th.—Twenty-seven officers and men of the British Navy and seventeen officers and men of the United States Navy met their death today in the collapse of the giant dirigible ZR 2 over the city of Hull. Every one of the United States men on board the illfated craft perished, as far as could be ascertained at midnight tonight. The disaster occurred while the ZR 2 was on what was intended to be her final trial before being turned over by her British builders to the United States Navy
