The Editor "St Croix Avis,"

Dear Sir:-

Mr. Svendsen writes in today's issue of the Avis that a person who anonymously attacks him is a coward trying to hide his real motive. We take exception to this remark, and would beg to say that we have not attacked nor intended to attack Mr. Svendsen, but we have assailed his system, and whether we sign our real name or write under a pseudonym would not alter the facts. We will make this proposal: If Mr. Svendsen will show publicly and satisfactorily that our complaint of the 17th instant was unwarranted or false, we will openly assume responsibility for this discussion under our own name. If on the other hand the matter was as repre-

sented, and the timely action of the police for which many are thankful would make us think it was, we see no reason for Mr. Svendsen to kick. When we complained of the behaviour at the theatre did we lie or tell the truth? Until it can be brought out that we misrepresented the case, it remains one of fact and not person. We consider it in the same light as if we invited someone to spend an evening at our house and also had some roughnecks there whose behaviour was insulting and annoying to our guest, but we failed to bring these ill-mannered people to order. Wouldn't there be just cause for complaint and blame of us for exposing our guest to such an experience? How much more then shall we expect protection at a place of public entertainment where an admission fee is paid, not only for the amusement, but for the opportunity of enjoying said amusement. No one has any more right to make it unpleasant for others in the theatre than on the public street, and just as we desire to preserve our peace and safety on the street, just so likewise in public places of amusement. We have not attacked Mr. Svendsen, we repeat, but we are unable to understand his position in this matter where he seems to resent our seeking what we are entitled to and need.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Winnipeg, May 15th. A disaster overtook a colony, fifteen miles west of here, on Saturday night. A temporary dyke, constructed by them to stem the approaching flood of the Assiniboine river gave way during the hours of darkness, allowing the water to cover about one thousand acres of wheat sown land immediately to the south, threatening one thousand other acres in lowlying spots and cutting off the colony from easy access to other districts.

London, May 14th. The cabinet committee on Irish affairs, headed by Mr. Churchill is considering the summoning to London of Sir James Craig and Messrs Michael Collins and Arthur Griffith for a conference on the internal situation.
