ST. CROIX STATION.

Port Arthur, Ont., June 12th.—The Presbyterian general assembly definitely settled the church union question here yesterday. Closure was applied and the debate which opened on Thursday afternoon and which was continued through sessions on Friday, Saturday and yesterday, was abruptly closed. Two votes were taken and the results were not as great as was expected. On both votes the assembly was divided on the straight issue of union. The first vote was taken on the question of an amendment involving a halting of the negotiations, which was proposed by the Rev. Dr. Drummond of Hamilton. This was defeated by 416 to 137. The second vote on the main motion to adopt the report of the union committee, was carried by a vote of 416 to 129.

Toronto, June 12th.—The action of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, which yesterday votes 426 to 129 in favor of church union will unite the Methodist, Presbyterian and Congregational churches into the united churches of Canada, after 29 years of negotiation on the matter. Numerically the Methodist and Presbyterian denominations are two of the three strong Protestant churches of the Dominion, the other being the Church of England.

The Congregational is also a fairly large and active denomination.

Montreal, June 12th.—The "Gazette" says: "The Presbyterian Church in Canada may not disappear. Certainly some congregations will decide against remaining in the union and they may reconstitute a Presbyterian church for Canada. It will be a weak body as to numbers, however strong it may be as regards spirit, and consolidation of this may well lessen the proportion that when the hour to decide comes will choose to step outside."
