outlined that only 8 per cent of the sugar be exported. The planters do not like this regulation because they claim it restricts their initiative and they want it removed. A large factory is to be erected in the eastern part of the island at a cost of \$1,500,000. Drought has affected the 1920 crop somewhat but the last two years have on the whole been quite favorable, making the manufacturers more hopeful after their experience with storms and other calamities.—*Ibid.*
