ST. CROIX STATION.

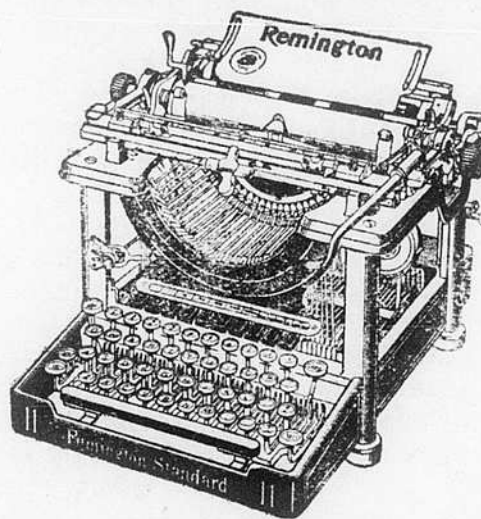
With the Greek Army in Asia Minor, July 17th,—Kutaia, Mustapha Kemals Strategical position in Asia Minor, was occupied this afternoon. Terrible fighting occurred before the town, owing to the Turkish resistance which lasted 72 hours. The losses on both sides were enormous but it was a decisive victory for the Greeks, who captured numerous prisoners and an abundance of artillery. The fall of Kutaia greatly disturbs the Kenalists, who will be unable to retain Eski Shehr, the new Greek objective. General Papoulas expresses the belief that the Turks have lost their principal defensive lines. The Greeks fought with spartan energy in the fierce bayonet attacks. They have advanced two hundred kilometres since the offensive began a week ago. The division commanded by Prince Andrew has made a marching record of 300 kilometres in ten days.

Constantinople, July 21st.—The Greek third army corps entered Eskishehr yesterday, according to a wireless despatch received here from the Greek battleship Averefin. Eskishehr, a town in Asia Minor, lies 27 miles northeast of Kutaia, from which the Greeks drove the Turks last week.

Paris, July 21st.—France, it was declared in official circles this morning, will send reinforcements to upper Silesia whether Great Britain joins or not in the reinforcement movement suggested by France. The French move will be made it is declared, to insure the safety of the ten thousand French soldiers already on the ground there. M. Briand sent a

note yesterday in reply to the British note on the Silesian issue expressing lack of conviction that the Supreme Council could serve any useful purpose by convening before measures are taken to assure order and to provide for the security of the Allied troops now in Upper Silesia. According to the interpretation official circles place upon the French communication. News received here today from Oppelin was far from reassuring. The attitude of the German press, as interpreted by the French despatches, was increasingly provocative. France, it is declared, recognizes that danger threatens from the side of the Poles as well as from the German side, making it doubly necessary in the French view, to reinforce the Allied troops. Precautions first, decisions afterwards probably will remain the French view, unless there are unforeseen development.
