THE "ISLINGTON CONFERENCE" of evangelical clergy of the Church of England, which has this year been held at the Church House, Westminster, was

notable for the outspoken address by Dean Inge, of St. Paul's Cathedral, on the question of Christian Union. Ecclesiastical statesmen, he said, had to reckon with the fact that many members of the Lambeth Conference, perhaps the majority, were stiff sacerdotalists, who would have been willing to break up the assembly rather than bate a jot of the dogma that a true Church must be episcopally governed. The prospect of a split in the Lambeth Conference was at almost any cost to be avoided. "The result," he declared, "was a report which used elaborately conciliatory language towards non-episcopalians, while maintaining the rigid principle that episcopal ordination is a necessary condition of recognition." He had great sympathy with Non-conformists who objected to reordination, and considered that the interchange of pulpits should be encouraged. "I can see nothing for it but what the Labour Party calls direct action. The law of the land gives us great liberty, and I suggest that we should use it, especially in Scotland. For my own part, I would purchase reunion with the Presbyterians and Wesleyans at the price of a considerable secession by our own extremists." Church reforms, he concluded, were prevented by those who refused changes which would bar submission to the Church of Rome.—Contributed.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Chicago, March 21st.—Wrecking crews today were clearing away the tons of debris scattered by an explosion on Saturday night in the elevator of the Armour Grain Company, on the south side, under which the bodies of four victims were believed to be concealed. Two known dead were blown out of the structure by the blast, which it was believed was due to spontaneous combustion which ignited inflammable dust. The grain loss was placed about \$1,000,000.00 by the Secretary of the company, who said that it was believed that the other \$3,000,000.00 of grain in the concrete pits could be saved.

New York, March 21st.—The raw sugar market was quiet early this morning at 5½ cents for Cuba's cost and freight, equal to 6.27 for centrifugal, with no fresh business reported. Refined was steady at 8.00 to 8.25 for fine granulated. Only moderate enquiry was noted. Sugar futures were fairly active and prices were 3 to 4 points lower under selling by trade and commission houses.

London, March 21st.—The House of Commons today passed the second reading today of the Bill for winding up the ministries of shipping and munitions.

London, March 31st. Mr. Austen Chamberlain was today elected leader of the Unionist Party. His election, effected at a meeting of the Unionist members of
