The art of keeping things moving has been finely mastery in "The Wonderful Chance," released by Selznick. It is full of dramatic punch and has been conceived with originality and directed with alertness. Dramatic climaxes are swift and frequent. Best of all, they are convincing.

A band of crooks kidnap an English nobleman, and in sending one of their own to impersonate him, discover that some one else has beaten them at their own game. They decide to doublecross the other crook, but he is too quick for them, and their carefully-planned blow ends in an anti climax.

Eugene O'Brien doubles as the English lord and the American who so closely resembles him. He makes a sharp distinction between his two characterizations, and is as usual a pleasing entertainer. Martha Mansfield is a charming vis-a-vis. The picture has been directed with pep, and everything and everybody has been made subordinate to the projection of the story. The crook angle furnishes the thrills, the mistaken identity angle the suspense, and the love interest, though of minor importance, adds the human touch.

the slightest hope, unless Germany abandons her passive resistance in the Ruhr. If Germany is wise enough to yield on this point, there would be no difficulty with France about the precise figure of reparations. There is a growing belief, according to this writer, that Belgium is tired of the prolonged deadlock in the Ruhr, and he adds, that the key to the situation now lies in Brussels, where Wednesday's conference is likely to be the starting point of wider negotiations from which Great Britain cannot be excluded.

Saragossa, June 4th. - Cardinal Soldevila Y. Romero, aged Archbishop of Saragossa, was shot and killed while visiting a monastery in the vicinity of this city today. The Cardinal was seated in a motor car with his Secretary when attacked by a group of unidentified men. The chauffeur was killed and the Secretary severely wounded. A search for the assassins is under way.

London, June 4th. - The Times Madrid correspondent says the assassination of

Cardinal Soldevila was connected with a labour dispute between the Cardinal and some workmen employed on his property. The Cardinal was reputed to be generally beloved in Saragossa, where he had been Archbishop since 1910. He took a prominent part in connection with the Government's proposal to grant greater freedom to non-Catholics.

London, June 4th. - Newspaper reports that Sir Auckland Geddes was retiring from the position of Ambassador to the United States were characterized as entirely unfounded by Mr. Ronald McNeill, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in the House of Commons today.

Paris, June 4th. - Russian monarchist delegates, both of autocratic and constitutional tendencies, have been assembling in Paris with a view to acceleration of the restoration of the Monarchy in their country. It is stated that a call for action may come soon under the leadership of Grand Duke Nicholas, first cousin of the late Czar.

Washington June 4th. - The Govern-

ment's injunction suit to prevent dealing in sugar futures upon the New York coffee and sugar exchange has been advanced by the Supreme Court for hearing on November 12th.

London, June 4th. - The complete agenda of the Imperial Conference, which will be held in London in October, has not yet been received from the Dominions, but it is learned that Australia has intimated that she will raise the question of tariff preference.

Berlin, June 4th. - Westphalia has commenced minting a 10,000 mark coin, made of a low value metal, for which Berlin numismatists already are paying as high as 10,000 paper marks. Gilded the Westphalian 10,000 mark piece has the appearance of a gold piece.

St. Johns, N. F., June 4th. - Changes in the Cabinet were announced today by Sir Richard Squires preparatory to the opening of the Legislature on Wednesday. Mr. Thomas Bori, recently appointed Minister of Finance, but defeated in the general election last month, has been transferred to the Postmaster Generalship, while Mr. Cave, new Minister of Shipping, becomes Minister of Finance. The Department of Shipping is to be abolished and the activities of the department will be transferred to a bureau under the department of marine and fisheries. Lacking a seat in the House of Assembly, Mr. Bori will probably be appointed to the Legislative Council.

London, June 4th. - The Archbishop of York, preaching at Leeds on the worldwide efforts now being made to achieve some measure of Christian unity, said even within the church of Rome new voices might be heard questioning whether a rigid unity, imposed by authority, was the highest type of Christian unity.

England during the last two years, though little was known about it by the outside world, some of the bishops had been meeting representatives of the six great nonconformist churches, the Archbishop said. They had come to a position of some difficulty, but he thought that no man who had gone through his period of friendly, frank conference with the leaders of English protestantism, could doubt that the men who had gone thus far were meant to go further on the way of unity.

London, June 6th. - Papyrus won the Derby run at Epsom Downs today. Pharos was second and Parth third.

Dublin, June 4th. - Ireland won the Davis Cup elimination series with India here this afternoon, three matches to two.

London, June 5th. - The Rome correspondent of the Central News says that according to the Epoca, Gabriele D'Annunzio is on his way to Turkey to join Mustapha Kemal Pasha. D'Annunzio left Rome by aeroplane on Saturday for unknown destination.
