We are especially grateful to those who appeared before the Commission and gave their testimony as requested and while it has been rumored that some of those who so testified may suffer personal loss or persecution by reason of having stated the facts as they knew or believed them to be, this Commission would be deeply grieved to learn that any vindictive or resentful action had been taken against any of the said witnesses either by process of law or otherwise; however should any of those who testified before the Commission be persecuted or made to suffer in any way by reason of their said testimony, the Commission would be glad to have any person or persons who may be victims of such persecution report the facts in full to either of the undersigned.

Again thanking one and all and pledging ourselves to do everything possible to improve conditions in the Virgin Islands.
