The marriage of Miss SIGRID LEVI, only daughter of Consul and Mrs. George Levi of this city, and Ensign KENNETH COURTENAY HAWKINS, U. S. N., was

celebrated at 8 o'clock Thursday evening, April 6, at the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The Rev. Symons, rector of the church, performed the ceremony.

Miss Levi, who was given in marriage by her father, wore a dress of white georgette over satin, bateau neck and lined with hand made rose buds, six triangular panels around the skirt, two panels from shoulder, one caught in at wrist with a silver bracelet corsage of orange blossoms. The maid of honor was Miss Enid M. Cruickshank, who wore a hand embroidered dress tulle sash, white satin picture hat and a bonnet of pink roses. Lieutenant James D. G. Wagnon, U. S. N., was best man, and the bride's maids were the Misses Hensley, Paiewonsky and Cramer with Miss Urbina Cramer acting as flower girl.

The bridal party were received at the church by ten officers lined up on each side of the aisles and after the ceremony passed under the beautiful arch of swords formed by the officers.

The bride is a native of this city, was born in January 1901 and has high accomplishments in the French language and in the art of music.

The groom was born on September 12, 1898 in Harrisburg, Penna. He entered the Naval Academy, Annapolis, in 1917 and graduated in 1920. He came to St. Thomas on U. S. Submarine 08 on February 25 of this year, met the bride at a reception given by Governor and Mrs. Kittelle for the Officers of the U. S. S. Savannah, on the same day of his arrival.

After the marriage ceremony a reception and dance was held at the home of the bride's parents. The guests numbered 140 including the Governor and Mrs. Kittelle and family, Naval and Military Officers from the station and from the warships in port, and prominent citizens and their wives.

TELEGRAMS.**ST. CROIX STATION.**

Ottawa, April 6th.—The House of Commons yesterday devoted itself to the discussion of a resolution introduced by Mr. Logan, member of Cumberland Nova Scotia, to the effect that only goods imported at Canadian ports should enjoy the British preference. He recalled the fact that he had introduced a similar resolution eighteen years ago and on subsequent occasions, his reason, of course, being based on the practical application of how it will affect the Western farmer
