Belfast, Oct. 5th.—In moving the adjournment of the House of Parliament until Decem. 13th, and giving the speaker power to summon it to meet again in case of emergency, Sir Jas. Craig, the Premier said yesterday "this course is somewhat unusual, but the prospect before us also is equally unusual and none can tell what the next few months may bring forth. I certainly would feel very much strengthened, by the knowledge that if untoward events arise at any time, this House will be called together so that the feelings of the members and the feelings of the Ulster people may be voiced on any proposals put before us. I have received no further invitation to a conference in London or elsewhere, and may be I will receive no such invitation in the near future. This resolution will guard against anything unexpected. Replying to questions concerning the conference Sir James said "the reasons that led us to make decision to enter the conference in Downing Street in July still hold good. To refuse to go in would leave us open to the greatest misrepresentation across the water. I have a feeling that we might be let down behind our backs. If no one is there to say a word for Ulster, Ulster might come out of this very badly indeed."

London, Oct. 5th.—A Reuter cable from Bombay says the arrest of the Ali brothers and other agitators against the Govt. has apparently aroused little excitement outwardly. Meantime Ghandi maintains that the alleged offense of the Ali brothers is nothing new, and says he intends to persuade the Sepoys and police to resign as soon as he is convinced that they are able to support themselves by the spinning wheel. The programme of the agitator at present is apparently to challenge the Govt. by organizing meetings at which resolutions containing charges against the Government will be adopted. Such meetings have already been held at Calcutta and Mampuri.

Ottawa, Oct. 5th.—Parliament dissolved as from today, it was officially announced this afternoon. No election date has been officially set, but December 5th is the most talked of, with nominations on November 21st.

Sydney, N.S.W., Oct. 5th.—Mr. John Storey, who in April 1920 became Premier of New South Wales, died today.

Geneva, Oct. 5th.—The second assembly of the League of Nations adjourned at six o'clock this afternoon after electing Brazil, Belgium, China and Spain, the four non permanent members of the Council.

London, Oct. 5th.—The bye-election

in the West Houghton division of Lancashire necessitated by the death of Mr. Tyson Wilson, Labourite, resulted today in the election of another Labourite member, Mr. R. J. Davis, by a majority of 4,009 over the Coalitionist candidate, Mr. James Tonge.

London, Oct. 5th.—A Reuter cable from Melbourne says that the premier, referring to an interview with the Australian Emigration Agent, cabled from London, which is alleged to have recommended the despatch of 100,000 emigrants yearly to Australia from the British Isles, says it would be folly to pour such a population in Australia until adequate arrangements have been made for making them wealth producers. Mr. Hughes thinks the figure quoted absurd. In his view the practical position is that from 12,000 to 20,000 might safely be sent out this year.

St. Thomas, Oct. 6th News Bulletin, re-paragraph dates from Sydney, N. S. we are now officially informed that no such appointment has been offered to Dr. Calder.

Paris, Oct. 5th.—Many persons are believed to be dead and burning in the wreckage of a rear end collision of two suburban trains in the half mile tunnel leading to the St. Lazare railway station, from which five bodies already had been recovered at 9 o'clock this evening. Twenty seriously injured persons and 53 slightly injured, also had been recovered. Seventeen coaches were burning and the firemen, almost helpless, were cutting a hole through the roof of the tunnel through the pavement of the Rue De Rome, to create an upward draft with the smoke and gas. The trains were filled with commuters, and it is said that any one remaining in the tunnel is almost certain to be dead. The collision occurred when the 5.52 train for the suburb Marly Le Roi crashed into the rear end of a train for Versailles, which left four minutes earlier on the same track, but which stopped inside the tunnel for some unexplained reason. Cries for help and moans were audible at both ends of the tunnel. It is felt that those who were trapped in the burning wreckage, will never be identified, as they would surely be burned to cinders in the intense heat yet unreached by the firemen, who were directing streams of water from both ends of the tunnel. Later it was learned that the fire started by explosions of small illuminating gas tanks in the coaches of the telescoped train. The train for Versailles had stopped to repair a broken coupling when the collision occurred. Hundreds of the injured were able to escape by running through the dark tunnel, along the track to both ends. Troops were called out immediately to surround the scene of the disaster.
