TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Philadelphia, June 1st.—Sweeping down the Schuylkill River three lengths ahead of the Navy, Pennsylvania's Varsity crew yesterday lifted the Child's Cup and the Stewards Cup in the same race, in the twentieth annual United States Regatta. More than 20,000 persons saw the Red and Blue Eight, coached by Joe Wright and Jim Rice, regain the Child's Cup after a wait of five years. W. E. Garret Gilmore, of the Batchelor Barge Club, winner of the single scull event last night cabled his entry for the Diamond Sculls to be rowed in England on July 15th.

London, May 31st.—During the war the British people subscribed huge sums which were to be expended on destructive measures. They did so for the sole purpose of saving the country. During these days of peace people should subscribe even greater sums, in order to provide constructive labour for the unemployed. This summarizes the arguments put forward by the Labour Party in urging that a sum amounting to not less than

500,000,000 pounds should be raised to finance the gigantic scheme for the relief of the unemployed for providing the necessary funds for the development and construction of public works, such as agricultural improvements, afforestation the utilization of water power and the development of public utilities, as well as the building of roads. The municipal authorities are overburdened now in providing relief, but they will probably subscribe heavily to any national scheme that was designed to lighten the burden at present laid on the taxpayers, if a return of their investment was guaranteed by the State. The scheme though complicated in detail, is quite simple in general principles. Labour will make its appeal to the patriotism of the people in the endeavour to raise this huge sum, believing, as they do, that some such scheme is the only way of saving the country from the effects of the Red propaganda which has been widely circulated among the unemployed and which may lead to disastrous results next winter.

London, June 1st.—All attendance records at the Empire Exhibition at Wembley were broken yesterday, when 150,000 people had passed the Turnstiles by four o'clock in the afternoon. The size of the crowd led to some difficulty for many of them to obtain refreshments. Queues of people four deep extended for hundreds of yards outside each cafe, while hundreds were compelled to eat at the refreshment stalls. Unprecedented numbers of apples were disposed of in the Australian pavilion, about 20,000 purchasers carried away 15 tons. Four Englishmen unexpectedly appeared in the cattle branding contest yesterday. One of them Frank P. Walker of Battersea, took the field against Cowboy King in the wild horse races, steerwrestling, trickroping and cowboy swimming races.

London, June 2nd.—There was a record attendance at the British Empire Exhibition at Wembley on Saturday, when 169,202 persons visited the exhibition, the West Indian pavilion being thronged throughout the day. The West India Regiment Band began their engagements today.

Paris, June 2nd.—The makeup of the Govt. that will succeed the Poincare Cabinet, which presented its formal resignation yesterday, was still a matter of decided uncertainty this afternoon, with the next development of the situation depending upon the action of the Socialist Party's congress now in session.

Moscow, June 2nd.—The Communist Party Convention ended Saturday night with the election of a new central committee, which is increased from 40 to 50 members, including the Party leaders Kamenoff, Zeimovieff, Rykoff, Kalinin and Bucharin, who were re-elected. The only new member of note is Leonid Krasin, who became a member of the Central Committee for the first time since the Bolshevik revolution. In spite of the at-
