

man and woman in Ireland deplored and detested these cold-blooded murders, which the cardinal says, "no object could excuse and no motive justify", and adding, "the perpetrators of such crimes are not real patriots, but enemies of their country". Turning to the Croke Park affair, the cardinal says the forces of the Crown were bound by their offices to protect and not to destroy the people, especially those within their rights and innocent of any offence.

London, Nov. 28th.—The conferences between Premiers Lloyd George and Leygues have been temporarily suspended, owing to the necessity of the French premier's return to Paris tomorrow morning. Premier Leygues is anxious to be present when the Chamber of Deputies discusses the question of French representation at the Vatican, and, in fact, requested that the debate be postponed one day, so that he could complete his labours here. He suddenly decided, however, to go to Paris earlier than he had intended, but hopes to return to London on Wednesday morning. Count Sforza, the Italian Minister, who is to take part in the conference with the Premiers, notably in connection with their consideration of the question of Greece, in view of the Greek demand for the return of ex-King Constantine to the Throne, arrived in London tonight. Mr. Lloyd George and Premier Leygues, conferring until a late hour last evening, definitely fixed the vexatious question of the Upper Silesian plebiscite in a manner the heads of the two Governments believe will forestall what they think of Germany's effort to pack the province with Germans for voting purposes. Under the plan of the Premiers that vote will be taken on several days, the status of a citizen to govern when he shall vote. It will be arranged that known citizens of the provinces, who the plebiscite officials are confident have lived there a number of years, will vote on one day. Others who have lived in the province a shorter time, will vote on another day while those who recently settled, will vote on still another day. Should the latter category swing the plebiscite in favour of Germany, and the bona fide citizens vote against Germany, the Allies are likely to declare the plebiscite void. The British Government will insist on the Greek army being maintained with its present strength, and that the Rhallis cabinet shall not include men viewed with disfavour by the Allies. The foregoing views are set forth in a memorandum which Earl Curzon has handed to the French Premier for perusal by the French cabinet when Leygues returns to Paris tomorrow. Great Britain disapproves the return of Ex-King Constantine to the Greek throne being made the subject of a formal protest, but nevertheless wishes that the British views shall be emphasized to the new

Greek Government. This is a firmer attitude than the British Government held a few days ago, and it is believed in confidence circles that it will appeal to the view of the French Government.

Dublin, Nov. 27th.—Arthur Griffith, head of the Sinn Fein and E. J. Duggan, Sinn Fein member of Parliament, have been taken to Mount Joy prison. It has not yet been decided whether they will be among those selected for the Ballykin-tar Camp. Internment in this camp, according to the authorities, would be a concession, as heretofore such prisoners have been held as common criminals.

New York, Nov. 27th.—The sugar markets on Wednesday were without special feature. If anything, the undertone in raw sugars was believed to be a little steadier, and while no sugars were really pressing for sale, Cuba's and full-duty paying sugars were available, at last paid prices, 4½c. for Cuba's and 4½c. for full-duty, but none of the offers were in really prompt positions and failed to attract the buying interest among the local refineries.

Madrid, Nov. 28th.—An earthquake shock was experienced on the twenty-sixth instant on the whole Galician coast, many houses were cracked and several persons injured.

Rome, Nov. 27th.—The Chamber has ratified the Treaty of Rapallo by a vote of 215 to 15.

Washington, Nov. 27th.—The United States will not be represented in any way at the conference which will be opened at Sanjose, Costarica, on the

1st December, relative to the union of the Central-American states. The attitude in Government circles shows that the proposed union is viewed favourably.

Washington, Nov. 27th.—The State Department announces today that Mr. Colby, who proposed to leave on Sunday for South America on official visits to the Governments of Brazil and Uruguay and an unofficial visit to the Argentine Republic, will not be able to leave before Tuesday or Wednesday. Great pressure of business is given as the cause of the delay.

Washington, Nov. 27th.—The Russian Embassy has given three hundred thousand dollars to the American Red Cross for the relief of the thousands of refugees in the Crimea.

Rome, Nov. 27th.—Rumours are in circulation here this morning that Ex-King Constantine will embark at Venice today on his way to Greece.

Jamaica, Nov. 30th.—Senator Harding, President elect of the United States and his party of 45, landed at Kingston this a. m. on the way back home from viewing the Panama Canal. A public demonstration which had been arranged has been modified in view of a wireless message that he is travelling for rest. Mr. Harding will breakfast at King's House, then motor to Castleton gardens, where he and his party will have luncheon. Thence they will travel through the principal banana producing parishes and join his ship at Port Antonio, sailing this evening homeward.
