TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 7th.—London successfully heralded the opening of the county cricket season on Saturday. The Prince of Wales attended the Australians match against Surrey at Kennington Oval. The Australians scored 325 for six wickets, their principal scores being Collings 158 not out and Macartney 87. Rain prevented the start of several county wicket cricket features.

Maidstone, England, May 7th.—Mr. Lloyd George declared today that if Germany disarmed in accordance with the Treaty of Versailles, she was entitled to ask that the Allies insist upon the disarmament of Poland. "Great Britain", he said, "believes in fairplay, and if the treaty were enforced, it must be kept all along the line." The Prime Minister trusted that wise counsel would prevail in Germany and that she would accept the Allied terms. He said he was hopeful she would do so. Discussing the miners demands for higher wages involving Govt. aid, the Premier said the taxpayers could not be expected to pay the miners wages. The mining industry must bear its own charges, he declared. If there was to be a permanent settlement, it must be on that basis. The cost of British coal must be reduced. If Great Britain was to retain her coal trade he told his hearers. United States Coal, he said, was becoming a serious competitor in markets where Great Britain was formerly predominant, and foreigners would not buy British coal while the United States product was cheaper.

Warsaw, May 7th.—In the face of increasing clashes between the insurgents and Germans, the Polish Govt. had deci-

ded upon a vigorous plan of action in an attempt to settle the insurrection in Upper Silesia. The Polish Cabinet has issued a statement to the effect that while the military thoroughly understood the patriotic motive which led to the spontaneous outbreak throughout the mining districts, the Govt. disapproved of the insurrection, and considered the movement a vain attempt to attain the desired end under present circumstances.

Paris, May 9th.—A Berlin despatch to the "Matin" says that the French Ambassador in that city has informed the German Foreign Office that all incursions of German Government troops in upper Silesia would be considered by France as a violation of the Versailles treaty. Advices from Beulhen state that an offensive against the Poles, who have virtually taken over most of Upper Silesia, is being planned by German civilian guards, which are being concentrated along the Ober River. The inter-allied commission at Oppeln is reported to have issued an appeal to the people of that city exhorting them to be calm, and declaring that Oppeln will be defended against all attacks.
