To the Editor of St. Croix Avis.

Dear Sir:

In consequence of different arti-
cles that have appeared in different local
papers concerning the Experiment Sta-
tion here in the island, we think it only
fair to its Leader—Dr. Longfield Smith—
to give our opinion on the matter. When
the Experiment Station originally was
started in the island, the planters volun-
tary paid through the Custom House into
the Colonial Treasury 1% of the value of
sugar exported to help defray the expen-
ses of said Station and Planters there-
fore should be the right party to say whe-
ther they think the money well spent or
not. The Planters here have been very
reserved and the Station has often been
the object of strong criticism and its
Leader has years ago met a lot of oppo-
sition in many ways, but with his never
tiring always gentlemanly ways of argu-
ing and bringing actual proofs for his
arguments, he has gained the confidence
of most Planters who now are seeking
him for advice. Anybody more willing
and anxious to come in your fields to find
out the trouble and give advice would be
impossible to get, and we can only
thank the Doctor for the trouble, and
patience he has taken all these years to
introduce any new Seed and improve our
Cultivation.—Of things the Doctor has
succeeded with in the line of improve-
ments we will mention the "Black Rock
Potato" which the labouring Class direct-
ly have benefited by—also the better
breed of Maize. The Editor of the Herald
in an article states, that an excellent
quality of Maize was produced here in
the island 20-30 years ago, don't doubt
it, the old time was always the best
time, but what has become of it, the
Exp. Station has certainly bred and
