Dear Sir:

Following the suggestion coming from the delegates of the Virgin Islands Protective League of New York to use our good offices as a means of reconciliation between the contending factions of Labour and with justice to the Capitalist and from informations gathered

directly and indirectly, that the success of such a venture hinges upon personal matters, which the recognized leader of one of these factions hold against me.

The point at issue in my opinion is, whether we can progress in these islands under the existing conditions, or if it is not to the best advantage of all concerned to come together as a unit.

Since therefore it is thus established that personal grievances against me, blocks a reconciliation of these factions, I do now declare myself willing to stand upon a public platform with any individual, who may have ought against me.

If in the consensus of opinion, I am WRONG, I'll shake hands with my opponent.

If I am right, I need no apology, because I feel that I am a man, and not a child.

Whether this challenge is accepted or not, I do further declare myself free from malice, and am prepared to meet any man or woman who has love of country at heart, is willing to grab the principle and put individualism aside.

The Virgin Islands Protective League will not recognize any report that is not duly signed by its delegates

Therefore, neither Miss Hendrickson or myself can consider as official any matters effecting these islands or the people, that is not brought to the attention of both of us, and at the same time.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Jany. 6th.—It is reported in diplomatic quarters, that while it will not be impossible for the exchange of ratifications to take place on Saturday, the ceremony may be delayed until Monday, this is due to the difficulty encountered by the commission of experts.

London, Jany. 5th.—Three banks, namely the Bombay, the Madras, and the Bengali, have called meetings to consider the amalgamation with the Imperial Banks of India, these banks operate under strict Govt auspices.

Washington, Jan. 7th.—The United States will not make a demand for the payment of interest accruing on loans to the allied powers, but will fund this into a period of years, until the European financial conditions become normal again. The Ways and Means Committee point out through Mr. Glass, the Secretary of the Treasury, that interest on America's loans to Europe now amounts to more than \$440,000,000 and that the payment of this is impossible under the present conditions in Europe and with the present rate of exchange.
