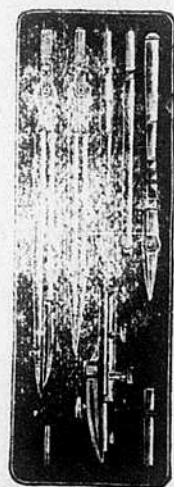

ST. THOMAS NEWS.

Last evening between 10 and 11 o'clock a disturbance that might have resulted in serious trouble occurred down town between the Market and "75."

From the information to hand, gathered from one who was present, it seems that two Marines had been beaten by sailors and were mad for revenge.

How the row started we don't know but the men crossed from the Market after smashing the wind shield of the Governor's car which was standing there, to the pavement opposite.

Here, just in front of Mr. Remo's place of business the proprietor and some other men were chatting. The two Marines approaching them asked if they had seen any sailors. The reply was "No." And upon inquiry as to what had happened, the information was given that they had been beaten by sailors. One of the Marines declaring that he had received two cuts, one in the neck and another in the leg. In evidence of this there were two or more fair-sized pools of blood on the pavement.

"Have you ever sailed?" asked one of the Marines.

"Yes, I once used to sail," replied Jno. Harris, one of the group.

"Yes! you once used to sail!" exclaimed the Marine, and let drive a stone. The missile missed its mark, but found another. One Reuben Prince who was standing nearby was struck by the stone and brought to earth.

The two men then went down by "75" Meanwhile, the chauffeur of the damaged bile had rushed to the Barracks and reported what was taking place. A sergeant was immediately set to the scene of the row and was just in time to prevent the occurrence of what might have been the cause of trouble of a far reaching nature.

As he approached the commissary building a few shots were fired by one of the two men, both of whom, we understand, had obtained rifles.

The sergeant after a short tussle with the one man—the other having fled—succeeded in disarming him and placed him under arrest. The second man was arrested a little later.

This is the second time that service men have obtained firearms and appeared on the public streets with same.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Feb. 20th.—An analysis of the latest list of world's records accepted by the international amateur athletic federation shows that out of some ninety standard events the best time or distance has been made by the United States Athletes in thirty seven contests. The nearest competitor of the United States for the honour of leading the world in the matter of record breakers is Great Britain, whose athletes have marked up the best time for distance in twenty eight events. Denmark and Finland are tied for third place, with seven records each. The United States is without a record holder in the walking events, in which Great Britain, Canada and Finland hold all records and is tied with Great Britain in the running records, each nation having thirteen to its credit.
