EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 23.

BE IT KNOWN:

That, in pursuance of the resolution adopted by the Colonial Council for St. Croix 17 October, 1921, which reads as follows:

"BE IT RESOLVED: That this legislative body, viewing with deep concern the serious economic situation confronting this island at present, request the Governor to appoint a select commission to investigate and endeavor to mediate the present agricultural dispute between employer and employee."

I, Sumner E. W. Kittelle, Governor of the Virgin Islands of the United States, who have, with sympathy and grave solicitude, learned of the conditions ruling in St. Croix and who would be glad to furnish any kind of assistance which would contribute towards a reasonable, just and satisfactory solution of the question, which might be acceptable to all parties, do hereby appoint C. C. Timmons, Esq., Chairman, and Messrs. Axel Holst, Dr. J. B. Thompson, Robert Skeoch, John L. Curry, Joseph Alexander and C. R. T. Brow, associate members of a Commission to investigate and endeavor to mediate the present agricultural dispute existing in the island of St. Croix between employer and employee.

That the Commission shall convene at Government House, Christiansted, St. Croix, Thursday, 3 November, 1921, or as soon thereafter as practicable;

That the Chairman and the Commission are hereby empowered to carry out all investigations and inspections which may be necessary or required to comply with the request of the Colonial Council of St. Croix;

That, in order to facilitate its work, the Commission is further empowered to summon witnesses, administer oaths, take sworn declarations and to require the production and presentation for

examination of such books, records and other papers as may be necessary in carrying out its investigations;

That the provisions of the St. Croix Code relative to contempts of court are hereby made applicable, in all respects, to the proceedings of the Commission, and the Commission may appear and be heard in prosecutions for violations or contempts of its orders;

That the Commission is authorized to employ such technical advisory experts, clerical and other assistance as may be necessary;

That, upon concluding its hearings, said Commission shall make to the Governor such report and recommendations as in its judgment will bring about or tend to bring about an adjustment or amelioration of the present situation;

That it is the Government's earnest desire that all persons render such assistance and hearty cooperation as may be in their power to the end that success may attend the work of the Commission.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Budapest, Oct. 31st.—Ex-Emperor Charles has again refused to sign his abdication to the Govt. plenipotentiaries who went to Tihany, where Charles was interned. What is declared to be an ultimatum was delivered yesterday to the Hungarian Govt by representatives of Great Britain, France, and Italy, in behalf of the Entente, demanding that Charles be handed over to the Commander of the British squadron, and the immediate proclamation of his deposition as King.

Paris, Oct. 31st.—Miss Lines of England yesterday established a world's record for women by running one hundred yards in 11 3/5 seconds. Miss Bleard, of France, ran the 1,000 metres in 3 minutes 17 3/5 seconds. The events were in connection with a meeting between British and French women athletes at the Pershing stadium.

Havana, Oct. 31st.—Threats against Major General Crowder, and the United States legation in Havana are contained in proclamations distributed here in connection with the Sacco Vanzetti case. The posters denounce General Crowder as a "Representative of the United States Bourgeoisie" and threaten the "dagger of vengeance" against him.

Moscow, Oct. 31st.—Paper money reaching the enormous total of 5,750,000,000 rubles has been issued by the Soviet Govt. the latest output being 750,000,000,000 rubles in new money for the opening of the national bank. The city Soviet has published an order permitting newspapers to publish advertisements which have been absent from the columns of journals here for four years. Advertisements have been taxed heavily.

Buenos Aires, Oct. 31st.—A despatch to "Lanacion" from Asuncion says that President Gondra of Paraguay has handed his resignation to Dr. Felix Paiova the Vice President, owing to a revolutionary movement by the followers of ex-President Shaerer. The revolutionists are reported to have the support of all the troops in the capital and country districts.
