THE GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION.

Death of Dr. Jose C. Barbosa, American patriot and Senator At Large of Porto Rico.

Whereas, the golden thread which has bound the life of Dr Jose C. Barbosa, champion of American ideals and Senator at Large of Porto Rico, to the hearts of the people of the Island, has been severed by the grim reaper of time, and,

Whereas, his untimely death comes with a saddening shock to the people of Porto Rico who have learned to love him for his steadfastness to lofty Americanism, and his unwavering patriotism throughout his years of public service, and,

Whereas, it is in keeping with the spirit of the hour for the people of Porto Rico to publicly recognize its most illustrious citizen;

Now Therefore, I, E. Mont. Reily Governor of Porto Rico, do hereby order the flags on public buildings to be placed at half mast and to so remain from this date until six o'clock Saturday, October 1st, 1921, and furthermore, I do hereby order and do declare Friday, September 23rd, 1921, an official day of mourning throughout the Island of Porto Rico, and during that day all public schools and public offices shall remain closed.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the Government of Porto Rico to be affixed at the City of San Juan this the twenty second day of September, Nineteen Hundred and Twenty One. —*Porto Rico Progress.*
