TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Warsaw Aug. 18th.—Warsaw now seems to be saved from the Bolsheviks, Marshal Pilsudski's armies no longer are obliged to fight a defensive battle, and the bold offensive on both wings has reached the first objectives and the Poles appear to be pausing before at-

tempting to develop their successes. The offensive on the left wing is being personally led by Generals Henry and Billotte, and already has yielded important results. It has once more put the Poles in possession of the key to the Warsaw defenses, the fork between the Narew and Bug rivers, while the forces advancing toward Mlawa, which have reached the Chenoff, 12 miles to the south of Mlawa, will force the Bolsheviks marching on Plock and Thorn to beat a hasty retreat, and consequently re-open the direct railroad line to Danzig. But the manoeuvre on the right wing along the line of Garvolin and Paratchoff, between the Vistula and the Bug, is the more interesting of the two from the strategic viewpoint, because it threatens the communications of the main Bolshevik forces. Swelled by troops freed by shortening the front in the Brody region, the movement already has gained rapid headway, and driven the Bolsheviks back all along the line toward Brest-Litovsk for distances varying from 25 to 50 miles.

London, Aug. 18th.—The headquarters of the League of Nations announced today that four important amendments to the covenant have been signed by Denmark, Norway and Sweden for consideration at the first meeting of the League Assembly on November 15th. The four proposed amendments were announced as follows: 1. Providing for a fixed annual meeting of the Assembly, and proposing that ten members of the League can demand and secure a special meeting at any time at the Seat of the League. 2. Seeking to regularize the method of selecting the four non-permanent members of the Council. It is proposed to accomplish this by providing that the Assembly, after making the first selections of four to serve, respectively three, four five and six years shall name a new state yearly after the third year to serve four years, and not be subject to re-election for the following period. It is suggested that this method would secure successive representation on the Council of a large number of States, and would maintain continuity in the composition of the Council. 3. Making the obligation for arbitration more absolute by omitting the word "General" from Article III in the paragraph beginning "Disputed" and ending "Submission to Arbitration". 4. Permitting the Council to authorize a state in the vicinity of a state against which an economic blockade is in force to maintain a degree of intercourse with the latter, provided the Council considers this necessary in order to prevent the blockade state from attacking its neighbour.

Warsaw, Aug. 18th.—Russian Soviet forces are evacuating Brest-Litovsk, the strongly fortified town on the Bug River, 20 miles east of Warsaw, according to advices received here tonight.

Paris, Aug. 19th.—Lukow, a Polish city, about 41 miles southeast of Warsaw and 12 miles south of Siedlce, has been captured by the Poles in their counter-attack against the left wing of the Bolshevik army before the Polish capital, says the Warsaw correspondent of the newspaper "Excelsior." The despatch which was sent on Tuesday night, declares the Bolshevik right wing also is in a bad situation.

London, Aug. 19th.—The Lord Mayor of Cork arrived here yesterday under heavy military escort, having been deported from Ireland under a Court Martial sentence. He has been lodged in prison.

London, Aug. 19th.—Irishmen of moderate views concerning the problem of Dominion Home Rule will gather at Dublin from all parts of Ireland next Tuesday for a conference. This meeting, says a Dublin despatch to the "Daily Mail" has been endowed with a considerable importance by the change of policy in Downing Street. Although the Premier's statement in the House of Commons last Monday puzzled Irish Politicians it is wrong to take a pessimistic view of the situation, as the way to peace is by no means closed.

Olympic Stadium, Aug. 18th.—Included in today's programme were the elimination heats in the five thousand metre obstacle race and the finals in the 10,000 metre walk, the 110 metre hurdles was won by E. Thompson of Canada. Three United States runners, a Swede and a French entry, competed with Thompson. This morning's events were run under a broiling sun. Announcement was made that although the Olympic Rules prohibited it, the Marathon Committee had decided to permit runners in that classis event, on Sunday to receive sustenance en route. Stations will be established each five miles, where men may arrange to have their favourite refreshments awaiting them. Athletes, their trainers and experts from all parts of the world, were still today discussing yesterday's 800 metre race, which was declared to be the greatest ever run. Those who qualified in the 16 pound hammer throw, were Patrick Ryan, U. S., 52.58 metres, Bannett U. S., 48.23 metres, C. Lind, Sweden, 48 metres, Svensson, Sweden, 47.29 metres, McGrath, U. S., 46.69 metres, N. Lind, Sweden, 44.87½ metres. The final heat of the 10,000 metre walk was won by Prigeric of Italy. Pearman, U. S., was second, Gunn, Great Britain, third, McMaster, South Africa, Fourth, Hir, Great Britain, fifth and Marconey, U. S., sixth. The winners time was 48 minutes 61 5.
