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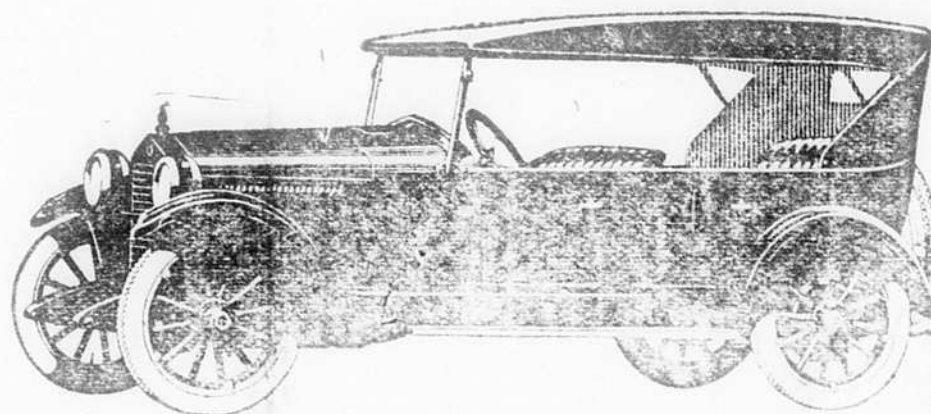

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, April 26th.—The English Association Football Cup Final was played today at Wembley Stadium before enormous crowds who had come from all parts of the British Isles to witness the match. It was won by Newcastle United by a score of two goals to nil, both goals being scored in the second half. The Aston Villa team had been strong favourites for the championship trophy and it is estimated that many thousands of pounds were lost today, the odds having been offered against the winning team. The teams met in a league encounter early in the week, when Aston Villa beat the Tynesiders in decisive fashion, winning by a 6-1 score.

London, April 26th.—Two persons were killed and between thirty and forty injured in a train smash just outside Euston Station this morning. One of the many specials from Northern England bringing football spectators to the Association Cup Final at the Wembley Stadium between the Aston Villa and Newcastle teams, was standing in the mouth of the tunnel when an electric train from Watford, bearing early city workers, crashed into it at thirty miles an hour. Terrible scenes followed for an hour afterwards in the almost pitch darkness of the tunnel. The casualties occurred in carriages of both trains which were telescoped by the impact.

Berlin, April 26th.—The Ambassadors of the Allied Nations, as a result of the decision recently by the Council of Am-



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bassadors in Paris, yesterday made joint representations to the German Government calling attention to the existence of secret societies in Germany, said to be carrying on activities contrary to the

Treaty of Versailles and threatening the safety of the occupying forces. The representations request that the German Government put an end to these activities.
