TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, May 21st.—Mr. Bonar Law's throat trouble is not malignant, says the Times Parliamentary correspondent. This can be stated with authority and there is every reason to hope that his health will in time be restored. It is understood that he will not resign his seat in Parliament and will thus remain a member of the House of Commons anyway until the dissolution of the present Parliament, but it is definitely decided that his political career is closed.

Paris, May 21st.—General regret is felt in France at the retirement of Mr. Bonar Law and genuine sympathy is extended to him, for his upright honest nature has been fully appreciated here, notwithstanding differences of opinion between London and Paris. The "Petit Parisien" says that during the few months Mr. Bonar Law occupied the premiership "he always showed himself to be a perfect gentleman". This sums up the general sentiment.

London, May 21st.—Cambridge today defeated the West Indian by nine wickets. Cambridge concluded their first innings making 208 runs. In the second innings the West Indians made 179. Nunes 59, Austin not out 51. Cambridge made 89 runs for one wicket, thus winning the match by 9 wickets.

London, May 21st.—Preparations are in progress at Chatham and Portsmouth for the immediate despatch of light cruisers and minesweepers to Russian waters, according to the Daily Herald, which specifies four cruisers and seven sweepers, which have thus been detailed for Russian northern waters. 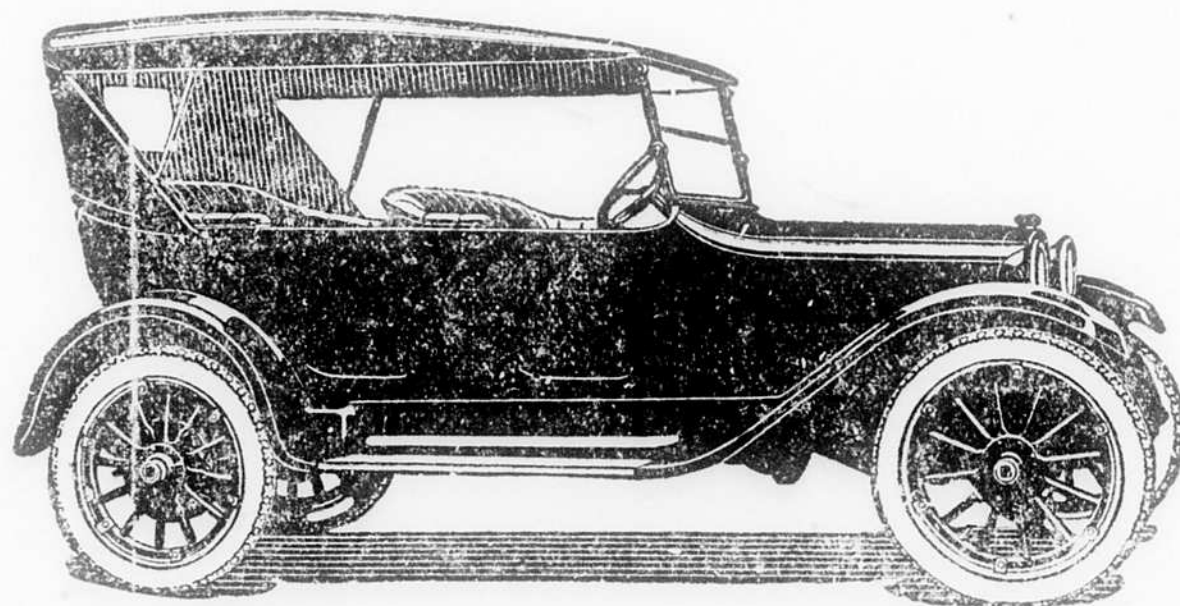
