TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Sept. 22nd.—Pitted against a picked team representing all New York the Incognito cricket team in the eighth match of their tour scored 277 runs at Livingston, Staten Island today. The first days play was marked by sensational batting on the part of Mr. Jardire, last years Oxford university Captain who scored another century, his total reaching 123. He batted for two hours and twenty five minutes. New York had scored 54 for the loss of three wickets when stumps were drawn for the day. Play will be resumed tomorrow morning.

Toronto, Sept. 22nd.—Steps were taken this morning to found a Federal Chamber of Commerce in Canada when a resolution introduced by Mr. Marriott of Toronto was adopted by the Congress of Imperial Chambers of Commerce at today's session favouring the project. A committee was appointed to act in the matter. The Congress also endorsed a resolution advocating admittance of Colonial Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce to an International Chamber of Commerce, and a resolution for stricter observance of the mail routes in the Empire. The resolution was endorsed as affecting correspondence.

Demerara, Sept. 22nd.—H. M. S. "Calcutta" with H. R. H. the Prince of Wales arrived here at daylight yesterday. At 10 a. m. His Excellency Sir W. Collet went off with his suite to pay his respects to His Royal Highness. The landing took place at 10.30 a. m. and a very large gathering assembled on the wharf and gave the Prince an enthusiastic reception. The arrangements were excellent. His Royal Highness and party then went in procession through the principal streets of Georgetown and everywhere excellent decorations for his reception were noted. On the pier was drawn up a guard of honour of armed police and His Royal Highness complimented them on their smart appearance. Included in the reception were numerous persons from the country districts and the reception was really a fine spectacle. The cheering was simply inspiring. At the reception at the Court of Policy Mr. A. B. Brown, senior member of the Court, read a cordial address of welcome and in his reply H. R. H. referred to the wonderful resources of British Guiana, the sugar cane, rice, bauxite, gold, diamonds, balata and other industries. After the ceremony the Prince motored to Govt. House where he stayed with his personal staff and in the afternoon he went to the races and remained throughout. A very fine lunch, given by H. E. the Governor, was attended by a large number of persons. The principal race, the Prince's Cup, was won by "Carry On", a horse belonging to Mr. T. Flood. The Prince backed two winners during the day. After the races

H. R. H. repaired to Govt. House where a state banquet was given at which the leading people in the colony were present, in fact, two balls were given, one at Govt. House and the second, an overflow ball, at the Town Hall. H. R. H. went to the Town Hall first where he stayed a considerable time and then went back to Govt. House. The ball over, the Prince slept at Govt. House and this morning inspected the constabulary parade, visited the hospital and then went on board H. M. S. "Calcutta" at about 11.30. There were large numbers of people along the wharves to see him off and bade His Royal Highness farewell with tremendous cheering.

Grenada, Sept. 24th.—Punctually as previously arranged H. M. S. "Renown" with H. R. H. the Prince of Wales and party arrived at 9 a. m. H. E. the Governor, accompanied by the Administrator of St. Vincent, members of Executive Council and two aides-de-camp proceeded on board the battle-cruiser at 9.30 a. m. to pay their respects to His Royal Highness, who with his staff landed at the wharf and was received by H. E. the Governor, His Honour the Administrator of St. Vincent, the Chief Justice, members of the Executive and Legislative Councils, Chairman of the District Boards and the Clergy. After inspecting the guard of honour of the volunteers and the cadets of the Grenada Boys School, the Prince proceeded through elaborately decorated streets and arches to the Court House, where he inspected the officers and non-commissioned officers and men who took part in the war. On arriving in the Council Chamber, H. E. the Governor said a few words welcoming His Royal Highness to the Windward Islands. Addresses were then read by the Hon. D. S. Defreitas, senior unofficial member of the Executive Council and unofficial member of the Legislative Council and by His Honour S. Joyce Thomas, acting Administrator of St. Vincent. In the course of his reply to these addresses the Prince said that he was delighted to set foot in the ancient colony of Grenada and thanked the Governor most sincerely for his cordial welcome and loyal address. He was reminded of the visit paid to the colony by the King who had very happy memories of those days. He was himself delighted to be making his first acquaintance with the colony. He felt that his journey in the vast empire had not only been pleasant but an inspiring experience. He was sorry to be unable to visit St. Vincent but asked its Government and people to accept his thanks for their address presented in Grenada. He was glad to learn of their prosperity and would always take deep interest in their welfare. After these addresses he visited the Market Square where he spoke to the school children gathered there. The party then went to Govt. House and from there to the Grand Etang. The Prince
