The following is a copy of the Sanitary Regulations of January 30th, 1886 for the Towns of Christiansted and Frederiksted:

Par. 28. The Board of Health has control with the sale of provisions to secure that no spoiled provisions or such as are injurious to health shall be sold, and for this purpose shall frequently and at uncertain times have examinations made of traders shops and stores. If any such provisions are found they shall be destroyed or be made harmless to health, according to the more particular directions of the Board of Health, and at the cost of the party concerned. The sale or offering for sale of such provisions is forbidden. For making the above mentioned examinations the help of persons versed in such matters may be obtained at the cost of the Municipality.

EDITORIAL.

With reference to our editorial notes of the 25th. on sanitary affairs, the attention of readers is invited to paragraph 28 of the Sanitary Regulations which have been in force since 1886, sent us by the Chief Sanitary Officer for publication it being the understanding of the Department that under the provisions of this paragraph the Sanitation Service may inspect bread making and in event the conditions under which the work is carried on be found contrary to sanitary requirements as approved by such inspection the dough or bread may be declared unfit for public consumption and ordered

destroyed. This is a question of interpretation it would appear since we are unable to draw such a conclusion from the wording of the text, and in all probability the courts would have to decide fully upon this.

As regards the order to keep doors of toilets open the Chief Sanitary Officer assures us that no such order has been issued. The request to unlock doors was possibly misunderstood and may be responsible for the seeming contrariness of this order as first reported.

The people are advised to understand well what is told them by emissaries of the Sanitary Department and in cases where extreme, far-fetched demands are urged, it is recommended to see the Chief Sanitary Officer who declares that his efforts are purely in the people's interests and in compliance with existing sanitary laws which will be administered with moderation and due regard for all concerned.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Galveston, Sept. 22nd.—An exodus of approximately 4,500 people, many of them out of town visitors, the shifting of the cars loaded with wheat and cotton to the main land, the vacating of ground floor in the district and the securing of all shipping in the harbour marked Galveston's preparations today in anticipation of the West Indian hurricane supposed to be sweeping down upon the Texas coast.

London, Sept. 21st.—The Executive Committee of the Miners Federation informed representatives of the men today that in the opinion of the committee nothing had taken place during the negotiations with the Govt. to justify the prevention of a strike of the miners at the expiration next Sunday of the strike notices previously handed in. Mr. Robt. Smillie the miners leader made this statement at a meeting of the delegates of the Federation who assembled at Memorial Hall in Warrington street to consider the coal crisis over which the executive committee and Sir Robt. Horne have been holding conferences recently. The men had abandoned their demands for a reduction of the price for domestic coal, but were unable to obtain the Govts. consent to an increase of two shillings per day in wages as demanded by the miners. Sir Robt. Horne's proposition was that the question should be submitted to an independent tribunal while the Federation insisted that the increase should be granted immediately.

London, Sept. 23rd.—Polish forces have started an offensive in the region of Grodno on the Polish front, according to an official statement issued yesterday in Moscow. Fierce fighting is proceeding it is said.

London, Sept. 21st.—A Persian despatch to the Daily Mail reported that the Bolsheviki have completely evacuated the important Caspian sea port of Baku.

Seattle, Washington, Sept. 22nd.—Orders calling nearly 3,000 miners in the state of Washington to strike next Thursday have been sent out. The men
