ST. CROIX STATION.

Lausanne, Dec. 8th.—Even M. Tcheitcherlin abandoned his previously extremely hostile attitude regarding the Dardanelles question at this afternoon's peaceful session of the Near East conference and expressed approval of the Turkish proposals for regulation of the Straits with the reservation that he must see the actual words of the sections covering the various points at issue before he could give full approval to them. Japan today spoke for the first time on the Straits problem.
