## OFFICIAL NEWS.

March 27, 1920.

Governor Oman has been officially informed from Washington that Hon. Albert Strauss and Mr. B. M. Angell, Special Commissioners of the United States Treasury Department to investigate matters relating to currency and exchange in the Virgin Islands, will arrive here by U. S. S. Dolphin about April 19, 1920.

Due to lack of funds work on the U. S. S. Tadousac at the New York Navy Yard has been stopped and her arrival at St. Thomas is now indefinite. Governor Oman has previously announced that this large oil burning tug will perform duty additional to that of the U. S. S. Vixen.

## TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Mayence, March 25th.—Advices from Berlin state that a definite agreement has been reached in the Ruhr Basin between the workmen and the Government on the following conditions: The formation of an army of workmen charged solely with the maintenance of order, the alteration of the Government with participation by the syndicates. The disarming of those who participated in the Coup d'état, a vote on new social laws, the socialization of the mines and the dissolution of revolutionary formations and the formation of counter-revolutionary bodies.

Constantinople, March 25th.—As a result of the arrest by the inter-Allied police of several nationalist deputies, the Chamber adopted a motion protesting against the action and decided to forward a protest to the parliaments of England, France and the United States. Despatches from Anatolia state that the news of the occupation of the capital produced an enormous impression, but Mustapha Kemal counselled the population to be calm. A sharp anti-nationalist movement occurred in consequence of exactions by the nationalists and a similar movement has been produced in the region of Bigha, Balikissa and Panderurais in the region of Aidian, the nationalists having attempted to pillage the town of Salichia, they were exterminated by the population.

Paris, March 25th.—After a sitting within closed doors, which lasted for two hours, the High Court continued hearing the testimony of witnesses for the defence, notably M. Thomson, ex-Minister of Commerce, who explained that in November nineteen fourteen he entrusted M. Caillaux with a mission which had for its object the search for products which might serve for the National Defence to search for foodstuffs and also to inquire into the furnishing of articles to Brazil which hitherto had been furnished by Germany and which might be furnished by France and also to study questions relative to telegraph cables.

## FEDERATED BRITISH INDUSTRY.

It is understood that, with a view to

the Federation of British Industry, a new organization, known as the Federation of British Industry, has recently been formed in London. The Federation, the largest of its kind in the world, is composed of members whose capital, taking in all, amounts roughly to £5,000,000,000. Its activities are wide, but one of the principal duties of the overseas Organization of the Federation is to endeavour to stimulate trade as between markets in Great Britain and those Overseas.

From what can be gathered the organization intends to send representatives to various parts of the world. They have been interesting themselves in the question of the Confederation of the West Indies, and they have communicated with several influential people in West Indian Colonies with regard trade possibilities. —*Barbados Globe.*

## EMMIGRATION TO CANADA.

The Canadian Government, we learn, has issued orders to shipping companies notifying them that no immigrant, mechanics, artisans, labourers of any class, skilled or unskilled, shall land in Canada unless in possession of the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars cash, and sufficient money for the purpose of transportation to his destination. This order, it is understood, is effective until the 31st of March next. —*Ibid.*

The Czecho-Slovak Republic has created a commission to regulate the distribution of molasses and an elaborate system of laws have been formulated to cover every contingency relative to the handling of this important commodity. Thirty per cent of the molasses must be retained for fodder. All the factories must make returns to the commission and the latter has judicial authority over the whole molasses realm.

The commission has existed in some form heretofore. It reported the production of 1,169,445 quintals of molasses at the close of the year September 30, 1919, of which the alcohol or spirit factories got 641,806 quintals, yeast factories got 165,699 quintals and the rest was dispensed for various other purposes. —*Ibid.*
