TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Constantinople, Dec. 6th.—A special committee named by the National Assembly to study questions affecting the Caliphate, yesterday decided to create a Council of the Caliphate, corresponding with the college of Cardinals at Rome. Each Moslem country will have two representatives on the Council, which will act in an advisory administrative capacity to the Caliph and determine all questions relating to the Mohammedan religion.

New York, Dec. 6th.—The early raw sugar market was steady at four cents for spot Cuba's, cost and freight, equal to 5.78 for centrifugal. No sales were reported. Raw sugar futures were

steady. January declined three points under liquidation, while other months advanced 2 to 3 points on trade buying. No improvement was noted in the demand for refined sugar and prices were unchanged at 7.10 to 7.25 for fine granulated. Refined futures nominal.

Berlin, Dec. 6th.—It is reported that the Government proposes to raid an internal gold loan of between twenty and thirty billion marks for stabilization and cash reparations payment. The Government intends to notify the reparations commission of this, in time to enable the commission to submit a proposal to the impending London conference.

Berlin, Dec. 6th.—A trillion paper marks by December 31st is the prospect held out by the money presses, whose latest six days race has resulted in an addition to the nations already swollen paper flood of the sum of 110,000,000,000 marks. These figures are shown by the latest report of the Reichsbank, which gives the total notes in circulation up to the end of November as 754,000,000,000 marks.

London, Dec. 5th.—The Royal Commission has completed its inquiry into allegations regarding traffic in honours. It has reported in favour of a scrutinizing committee of the Privy Council to examine the lists of would be recipients and would make it a penal offence to pay money in order to obtain honours. The Commission makes other suggestions looking to ending the traffic.

London, Dec. 5th.—Mr. Bonar Law, replying in the House of Commons today to a question asked as to whether with a view of finding temporary or permanent settlement for non-Turkish refugees out of Asia Minor or Constantinople, the Government would invite the Dominions to cooperate in providing the necessary facilities therefor, replied that enquiries were made on this subject. He said a report from the British Embassy at Constantinople on the needs of refugees was being forwarded to the Dominion Governments. Colonel John Ward, National Liberal representative of Stoke-on-Trent, declared that the Dominions already had taken action, besides contributing considerable sums of money for refugees. The Premier said he was not certain as to this.

London, Dec. 5th.—Mr. Bonar Law addressed the entire Parliamentary association at its annual meeting here today, declaring that the Dominions were entitled to a larger share in the direction of the whole policy of the Imperial machinery and he said, "What is more important, they are now very conscious of it." He led up to this declaration by saying, "during the war, when I had the opportunity of seeing a good deal of our Dominion fellow soldiers, I had a feeling which events have since justified, that our relations afterwards could never be quite the same.
