TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 24th.—The House of Lords passed without amendment the third reading of Lady Astor's bill prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors to any person under 18 years of age. The measure, which has already passed the Common now becomes law, providing the assent of the Crown is given.

St. Johns, N. F., July 24th.—The local legislature met this afternoon and Mr. W. R. Warren informed the members that since last session the Squires' Government had gone out of existence. He stated that the Governor Sir William Allardyce, had called upon him to form a ministry in succession to that of Sir Richard Squires, who had resigned the Premiership and that he had accepted the commission. Before asking for an adjournment for a few days, Mr. Warren reviewed the general political situation in Newfoundland and practically intimated that he planned on asking the cooperation of the opposition in the formation of his cabinet.

Dusseldorf, July 24th.—The first time since the occupation General Degoutte was seen this evening strolling through the principal streets unaccompanied even by secret service men. Heretofore he had always moved about in closed limousine, or escorted by guards.

London, July 24th.—As a cooling respite from heated Commons' debate on reparations, disarmament and such subjects of international moment, British officials have been occasionally occupied during the unusually torrid summer hearing Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the Canadian explorer, urge British annexation of Wrangel Island and the bit of controversial land in the North Polar seas, to which Great Britain, Russia and the United States have made claims at different times during the last century. There is as yet no indication that Stefansson is likely to succeed in his object. The French Office is extremely reticent in discussion of possible annexation, its semi-official statements being limited to the declaration that the British Government has not formulated a policy regarding the plans. Russian officials in London, however, are not so backward, they assert with great positiveness that Wrangel Island is theirs and that the Soviets are well prepared to protect their island from British territorial ambitions.

Ottawa, July 24th.—Employment in Canada at the beginning of July is reported by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics as continuing to improve, increased activity being noted in all the provinces. Reports from 5,765 firms, with an aggregate payroll of 715,128 persons, showed an increase of some two percent in the employment afforded, the index number rising from 97.3 on June 1 to 99.5 at the beginning of July.
