U. S. NAVY PRESS NEWS.

Nov. 11th, 1920.

WASHINGTON: Scathing general criticism of the business methods of U. S. Shipping Board based on charges of corruption of employees and officials of emergency fleet corporation, padding of pay rolls, graft in purchase of supplies for and repairing government owned ships and scandalous waste of government money, are contained in report to Select House Committee which is investigating Shipping Board. Report is made by two former employees who had been investigating for years. No comment made by officials of Shipping Board, some of whom point out that charges are subject to proof and no comment should be made before formal hearing. Report in criticism deals in no case with personalities but in all cases with conditions.

KANSAS CITY: Peace is in sight in major league base-ball war according to statement of Garry Hermyn, representing the National League, when he appeared before minor league association. Association received telegram while speaking and told hearers that he had just been informed that the sixteen members of the National and American League would all attend in formal meeting in Chicago on Friday. Said message was signed by five club owners who remained loyal to Ban Johnson and refused to attend meeting last Friday which resulted in organization of new twelve club league.

WASHINGTON: Despatch to Star in Italian source says Adriatic question has been settled. Jugo Slavs this morning accepted main Italian points and only details remain to be arranged.

ST. RUTH, O.: The Peerish House of Holy Trinity Zechoslovak Catholic Church was dynamited early today, the porch being blown off but no one injured.

MANILLA, P. I.: Forty-eight persons believed to have perished when coast wise steamer Stabasiaic was struck by typhoon last Wednesday, according to a survivor reaching here. Fifteen survivors reached Cobu. Sixty four were aboard.

GENEVA: Bulgarians request for admission to League of Nations was received here today. Bulgarian Premier disclaimed for government and nation any complicity in decision of former King Ferdinand and his government to join central empires in the war.

ANNAPOLIS: Rear Admiral Thomas B. Howard, retired, age sixty-six, died suddenly at his apartments here today.

WASHINGTON: Word received here of death in Macon, Georgia, of Mrs. Emery Winship, wife of Lieut. Commander Winship, who was in Bunav here during the war in charge of recruiting for the Navy.

PARIS: Former King Ludwig of Bavaria is dead at age of seventy-five, says Munich despatch. Has been living in Swiss Mountains.

WASHINGTON: Interment at Arlington National Cemetery of Navy and Marine Corps over seas dead will take place at two o'clock tomorrow afternoon of the bodies of twelve officers and men being in the receiving vault at Arlington. The interment will be made with full ceremonies. Blue jackets and Marines will form guard of honor while other Blue Jackets and Marines will bear flag draped caskets to the graves.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Nov. 9th.—Mr. Lloyd George in his address at the Lord Mayor's banquet at the Guildhall tonight discussed briefly and pointedly various problems with which the Govt. is dealing. He plunged immediately into Foreign Affairs and appealed for patience and faith in the world settlement, declaring that the highest wisdom demand that prejudices and dislikes be kept under control if Europe is to be saved from becoming a welter of raging hatreds. With regard to Germany, he declared himself personally pleased with the proposals of that country for the liquidation of her obligations. Coincidentally Mr. Chamberlain announced in the House that Germany had placed a large amount of bonds in the hands of the reparations commission. The Premier spoke optimistically of Ireland, intimating that the situation there was well in hand. Referring to questions between Germany and the Allies, Mr. Lloyd George said that the real test of Germany's sincerity was disarmament and he added, "the report I have to give on that subject is very satisfactory. The German army is rapidly being reduced to 100,000. There are still too many rifles at large in Germany, but they are a greater menace to Germany's peace than to Germany's neighbours. Another important point was reparations. Germany is prepared to submit certain proposals for the liquidation of her obligations and personally I am pleased with them. They will be considered at the conferences and it is satisfactory to note that Germany realizes that her first duty is to repair the devastation the German armies wrought. I wish I could speak as hopefully of the Russian problem where we have to do with men professing the "Red crazy temper of Bolshevism", who fail to realize how important it is they should respect their obligations. He re-

ferred briefly to the industrial situation and the recent coal strike, expressing the belief that there is better temper now all round. Speaking of the Irish situation the Premier said "Unless I am mistaken I do not pay too much attention to detailed accounts disturbances and what they call the horrors of reprisals given out by the participants who slur over the horror of murder, there will be no real peace, no conciliation until this murder conspiracy is scattered. We are getting the right sort of men and we are dispersing the terrorists. The Govt. will seek further powers if necessary to deal with the situation. If it is war, as the terrorists say, then they cannot complain if the Govt. employs some of the rules of war against them." He referred to his offer to discuss any proposals with anyone able to speak on behalf of Ireland, saying, "If I had given that invitation in the middle of the war, I might have had a response, but giving it to Ireland no man dare to respond. They are intimidated. You must break the terror before you can get peace. What the Govt. is offering Ireland is a partnership in the greatest Empire the world has ever known, at the height of its power"

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 9th.—For the first time in four years flour was sold under the ten dollar a barrel mark at the mills here today. Quotations on family patents broke 35 to 75 cents today making today's prices \$9.65 and \$10.00 a barrel. Yesterday's sharp decline in wheat was given as the cause.

Genoa, Nov. 9th.—Bulgaria's request for admission to the League of Nations was received at the headquarters of the League here today. The application which came in from Premier Stamboulinski was received by Sir Eric Drummond Secretary of the League and is being forwarded to the members. Constantinople, Nov. 8th.—(Delayed). The Bolsheviki forces are making determined efforts to crush through General Wrangel's line on the Perekop Isthmus leading northwards from the Crimea to the mainland of Russia and are massing forces further to the east with a view to taking the long tongue of land known as the Isthmus of Tehongar. Five infantry divisions are attacking Perekop and fresh storming troops supported by artillery are being rushed southwards from Salkoum and General Is are being sent to force their way into the Crimea from the northeast. It is said that the Bolsheviki fear their armies will be caught by the winter before they are successful in crushing General Wrangel and that they will become demoralised.
