LOCAL

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Quebec, Sept. 18th.—The Premier will sail from this port on board the S. S. Montcalm on Saturday for the Imperial Conference.

Geneva, Sept. 18th.—Ex-Premier Salandra, of Italy, addressing the Council of the League of Nations today, refused to acknowledge that the question of the League's competency in the Greco-Italian issue could be raised, because that incident had been settled. He said Italy, however, would agree that the question of the general interpretation of the covenant be left to authorized persons. This was presumed to mean the permanent court of international justice.

Paris, Sept. 18th.—Mr. Baldwin, the Prime Minister, accompanied by Lieutenant Colonel Ronald Waterhouse, his private Secretary arrived in Paris this evening. At the station Mr. Baldwin was met by M. Pierre De Fouquieres, introducer of Ambassadors on behalf of M. Poincare. Mr. Baldwin and M. Poincare will have a talk tomorrow on the German reparation situation.

Paris, Sept. 19th.—M. Poincare and Mr. Stanley Baldwin conferred here today, presumably on the reparations question. Their conversation ended at 4 p. m. when M. Poincare went to the Quai D'Orsay and Mr. Baldwin proceeded to Rambouillet to be received by President Millerand.

Geneva, Sept. 19th.—The new development in the Fiume situation, caused by the appointment of an Italian General to take charge of the Government there, are viewed here with some concern, especially by the Balkan delegates to the League of Nations. The Greek and Bulgarian representatives conferred yesterday with the delegates from Jugo Slavia.

Moscow, Sept. 19th.—Hugo Stinnes,

the German industrialist, is in Moscow seeking to obtain agricultural concessions from the Soviet Government.

Paris, Sept. 19th.—Greece today disclaimed the measures of an apology prescribed by the Allies of the Janine murders and the incident, which for a time threatened the peace of the Balkans, is regarded as closed. At ten o'clock this morning the Allied squadron, led by the Italian warship Conte Di Cavour steamed through the haze into Phaleron harbour, where the waiting Greek ships rendered a salute of 21 guns to each flag. At the same hour memorial services were celebrated at the Roman Catholic Cathedral in Athens, in the presence of the Greek Cabinet and the Allied Diplomats, while at Preveza the bodies of the murdered Italian Boundary Commissioners were embarked for Italy with military, naval and civil honours.

London, Sept. 19th.—A total of 1,212,000 unemployed were registered in Great Britain last week, this being 12,000 fewer than were registered the previous week. The maximum of unemployed persons in the United Kingdom was reached on June 24th, 1921, when there were 2,045,000 registered.

Dublin, Sept. 19th.—The new Dail meets for the first time today, initiating what is generally expected to be a prolonged session. The swearing in of the recently elected representatives has been in progress during the past few days. The oath has been taken in private before the clerk of the house, in accordance with an arrangement made at the last session to avoid the possibility of unpleasant incidents on the floor, should any member refuse to subscribe to the pledge of allegiance as stipulated by the treaty. No protests have been raised and all has gone along smoothly, but no Republicans has presented themselves for the ceremony. All of De Valera's followers are maintaining their determination never to swear fealty to the King. They are equally firm in declaring their intention of ignoring the Dail. With the Republicans thus eliminated, no one expected any dramatic occurrence at the opening session, the agenda for which was confined to the announcement of the names of the members returned and the election of the speaker and the President of the Executive Council.

Dublin, Sept. 19th.—Mr. Wm. T. Cosgrave was re-elected by the Dail today as President of the Executive Council of the Irish Free State.

London, Sept. 19th.—Lord Sydenham has put forward a scheme for the levying of a small ad valorem duty on foreign imports at all imperial ports, entrusting the yield there to a permanent imperial council of 15 members, representing Great Britain and the colonies, which would work continuously for the development of inter-imperial trade by studying and assisting in cheap methods of communication, including shipping cable, wire-
