TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Aug. 25th.—A careful survey of the Trade situation does not confirm the view prevalent that the trend of events is all in favour of the export trade of the United States, according to the writer of a special article, to which the Daily Mail gives much prominence this morning and concerning which it says editorially that the great rush of imports into Great Britain seems to be ceasing and that exportation on a considerable scale is about to begin. The writer of the special article says the British Govt. chose September 1st. for the withdrawal of the import restrictions to accord with the arrival in this country of an unprecedented stream of shipping, which has been loading foodstuffs in Australia for Great Britain. Many vessels have already arrived and the ocean route is thronged with others, so that henceforth Great Britain will not be dependent on transatlantic sources for food, while the gathering of the home harvest, he adds, aids the situation. As regards British export prospects, the writer asserts it is well known in commercial circles that considerable stocks of textiles, cutlery and other goods are available for export. "America has been pouring goods into Europe" says the writer, "but the rate of exchange is now against American exporters who, with heavy commitments, are not pleased at the outlook for their trade and are not overjoyed by the removal of British restrictions. Many alert business men have advised the American manufacturers to cease flooding the British Market".

Quien charged with having intelligence with the enemy, and the alleged betrayal of Edith Cavell, will appear before the sixth court martial in Paris on Monday. The prosecution claims it will prove that after obtaining funds and help from the British nurse, Quien went to Holland and returned to Brussels as a German agent and betrayed her to the German commandant.

Copenhagen, Aug. 25th.—Unless something is done to remove the fear and prejudice with which they are now regarded, even by the Bourgeoisie there is little chance for the ultimate success of Admiral Kolchak and Genl. Denekine against the Russian Bolsheviks, said Dr. Camille Martiny, who has arrived here from Russia after a four years stay as head of the Danish Red Cross today.

Paris, Aug. 27th.—(Havas): The "Figaro" says it is the duty of America to ratify the treaty because the acceptance of a modification of it concerns not only the United States, but the whole of Europe.

London, Aug. 28th.—One of the chief causes for the unprecedented state of congestion on the London docks is said to be due to the enormous influx of wines and rum, for which the liquor trade gave tremendous orders immediately after the armistice was concluded.

London, Aug. 28th.—A cable to the "Times" from Wellington N. Z. states that replying to a deputation of the navy league, Admiral Jellicoe stated that any great reduction in the naval expenditure of Great Britain would be impossible and

likely to remain at about a pound per head. New Zealand, if desired to do her share in maintaining the navy should also contribute a pound per head, either as cash or by a New Zealand unit, maintained and trained in complete uniformity with the imperial fleet and in no way tied merely to the shores of New Zealand.

London, Aug. 28th.—Fighting has broken out everywhere in Montenegro and the whole country is in a state of revolution according to news received here. The situation is extremely serious and the Serbians are using strong measures in attempting to suppress the uprising.

London, Aug. 28th.—Mr. Arthus Henderson, the Secretary of the Labour party who being opposed by Mr. F. P. Fisher in the Widnes bye election, refused to meet his opponent on the same platform to discuss the former's alleged disloyalty in his statement in 1917, that he went to Russia empowered to dismiss Sir George Buchanan, then British Ambassador. Further it is stated Mr. Fisher failed to prove his disloyalty to the labour party.

Copenhagen, Aug. 28th.—Nikolai Lenin the Russian Bolshevik Premier, sent a delegation to Kispinev for the purpose of negotiating peace between the Russian Soviet Govt. and Roumanian according to a report from Budapest.

Paris, Aug. 28th.—M. Stephen Friedrich, the Hungarian Premier under the Archduke Joseph regime has formed a new cabinet for Hungary in which besides the Premiership, he assumes the post of Minister of Interior according to a Havas despatch from Budapest. Count Czaky is minister of foreign affairs.
