His Excellency the Governor arrived by the Vixen yesterday and, accompanied by Commander White and the Dispatching Secretary, attended the meeting of the Colonial Council, returning to St. Thomas at 5 p. m.

The St. Croix racers to participate in the Whit Races in St. Thomas went over by the Vigilant yesterday.

The theatre was as usual the attraction last night, and we hear only praise of the current serial which has taken well.

The official proceedings of the Council's meeting of yesterday will appear tomorrow, and it is therefore inexpedient to furnish a summary of it today, except that it may be mentioned that the amendment to the Food Ordinance introduced at the previous meeting by 2nd. elected member for Christiansted, Canegata, was rejected when put to the vote. This result was forecasted and is not surprising under the circumstances.

With reference to prices being affected by the drop in the rate of exchange, it is reported to this office that certain prices have positively been increased upon pretext of fresh lots of goods being dearer etc., and it is noted that these increases are in exact proportion to the

advanced value of the money. With the Food Commission as helpless as it is, and at best fixing prices only upon what are considered necessities we are at the mercy of the jugglers.

We glean, and venture to mention it as a piece of news the public is sure to welcome, that information is to hand that beginning July 1st. there will be twice a week power boat mail service from San Juan, P. R. via St. Thomas to Christiansted. This is indeed very gratifying and warrants the expectation of a good mail service in the Virgin Islands.

OFFICIAL NEWS.

May 8, 1920.

General John J. Pershing, U. S. Army, and his Staff, arrived in St. Thomas on the U. S. Army Transport "Northern Pacific" at 8 a.m. yesterday. He landed at Kings Wharf immediately, and was met by Governor Oman and his staff and was paid the usual Military honors. Honorable Ambrose E. B. Stephens, Member of Congress from Ohio, and Mrs. Stephens; Honorable Felix C. Davila, Commissioner to Congress from Porto Rico, and Mrs. Davila; and Miss Lafevra, sister of the President of Panama, were also in General Pershing's party. After a short automobile trip to "Tutu" estate and then to the West end of town where General Pershing and

Governor Oman visited the George Washington School. The distinguished visitors called upon Mrs. Oman at Government House and met several of the officers and wives. They then returned to their ship which sailed for San Juan shortly after 10 a. m.

The Governor will today forward to the Colonial Council for the Municipality of St. Thomas and St. John the appointment of a first appointed member, vice Mr. Valdemar A. Mller, resigned.

The U. S. S. Kittery is expected to arrive in St. Thomas today.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Berlin, April 23rd.—Germany will announce before May 10th the amount she will be able to pay as part of her indemnity to the Allies. The Finance Minister has not yet definitely indicated the sum.

Paris May 1st.—Notwithstanding the strikes, calm prevailed in Paris and all over France to-day. Being Saturday and a half holiday, the staffs of the greater number of commercial and industrial establishments had decided to close. The auto-bus and tramway services were running partially and the afternoon transport facilities were almost normal, thanks to volunteers who presented themselves in such numbers that the companies were compelled to refuse the assistance of a certain number. The water, gas, electricity, postal and telegraphs services were performed normally. With regard to the strike of railway workers, it was remarked that notwithstanding the coincidence of the first of May, there were few idlers among those employed on the passenger and freight trains, they being more numerous among those in the workshops, although notably fewer than during the last strike. The movement may therefore be said to have failed and at the close of the day a further improvement took place in the railway and other transportation facilities. Advice from the province state that order prevails everywhere, the number of strikers being fewer than last year, especially in the mining districts, where work continued without interruption. In various cities processions of syndicalists promenaded the streets without incident.

Paris, May 1st.—(Evening). The day closed without any serious incidents. On the Boulevard Magenta an attempt was made to enter the shop of a gunsmith, and in the resulting brawl some shots were fired, one person being killed, apparently by another manifestant.

Paris, May 1st.—At the conference of the ambassadors this morning it was decided to hand the Hungarian treaty
